

Says Confidence Need Of Moment

look Calls For Understanding Be tween Industry And Employees

New York (IPS)-Industry is in accord with many of the objectives of the administration but those objectives cannot be reached without confidence built on understanding between industry and its employees. Charles R. Hook, president of the American Rolling Mill Company, of Middletown, Ohio, told the Congress of American industry at its recent meeting here.

"We know from experience," he said, speaking on the subject of employment relations, "that we can no nore legislate peace, happiness and inderstanding in our industrial reations than we can promote love, con deration and affection in the family through the enactment of law. These things can come only through cooperation and there can be no real operation until there is first confiace built upon a foundation of standing,

"It is not enough to have understanding and confidence between the employer and the employee; there must be understanding, if there is to be confidence, between government and industry."

Mr. Hook said that after more than 32 years' experience with employee representation in his organization, he is convinced "the vast majority of American workmen are fair-minded."

"They want to do the right thing," he said, "and they will if they understand the various elements surrounding each situation affecting their peach

ing each situation affecting their per sonal well-being. I have heard but ter complaints from the men when dec ions were rendered contrary to the wishes and when at the same tim they were given all the facts and told why that particulardecision was necessary. On the other hand, problems of very minor consequence have resulted in ill feeling when they were not properly explained and discussed. Essentially it is a matter of understanding.'
