THE PEARL OF THE EAST

How many times I crossed that bridge in the Malate district of Manila and thought of the second 'shot heard round the world" that vas fired there.

While I was living in the bamooo barracks of the Manila Exposition, I crossed that bridge three times a day for my meals. I was eating in a Chinese restaurant just beyond the bridge at the time. The restaurant was on that side of the briage occupied by the Filipino army at the time of the outbreak of the Insurrection. Then, in the years that followed came war of the most desperate character. The soldiers of the Filipino army received no pay, the severeness of the model. usually no uniforms, provided heir own pon.es., ammunition
