"blight" on the town. Having little, if nothing in common with the townspeople, they were ostracized, and the love life and "carryings on" of the community became the byword of the town, increasing from whispers to a rumbling roar which reverberated throughout the state and which provided a prelude to the end of this queer sect.

Free love, sanctioned by the community's House of God, their ministers and their scriptures from the Bible brought in its wake multitudes of nameless though well-provided for children, but also brought about the community's downfall as far as staid old Wallingford and its orthodox churches and clergy were concerned.

**Community Banished**  
The ever increasing birthrate among members of the Community dug up a sheet of paper and a pencil, thinking I would try to score the fight. I started to make an outline by rounds, and when I was blocking out Round 11 the fight was over.

with changing conditions at the turning point of a new industrial era as well as the insistent public demand of the townspeople, clergy and press, caused the town officials to banish this colony from the town limits.

Accordingly in 1881 the Wallingford Community removed all trace of its colony here to Onedda, to join the present sect, where in later years, modified to a great extent by the strict laws of New York state they settled down to carve a name for themselves, which even stands out today in the manufacture of silver plate.

For many years thereafter the community still owned real estate which eventually passed into the hands of private interests, until today naught remains of this unique sect but Community Lake.
