56 Join On Confession Of Faith, 30 By Letter



ST. VINCENT'S DEDICATION

SCHEDULED FOR SUNDAY

Bishop McAuliffe To Be Present At Rites

Established 1913

The parish of St. Vincent de Paul's was established here in 1913 as St. Michael's Mission by Bishop John J.Nilan, where services were held each Sunday in a room over Beaulac's blacksmith shop in Main Street. On October 19, 1914, Rev. Michael Leo Regan was appointed as pastor of the new parish at which time the original St. Vincent de Paul's church was erected in Main Street. Upon the death of Father Regan in 1916, Rev. Dr. Joseph J. Joyce was appointed to continue the work here who remained for 16 years when he left to become pastor of Holy Trinity Parish, Wallingford. It was at this time that Rev. Jeremiah J. Broderick became pastor of the parish. He has established missions at Momauguin, Short Beach and Morris Cove, and was instrumental in bringing about the new edifice in Taylor Avenue.

The new St. Vincent's Church, recently finished, was begun on April 3rd of last year, and the first Tercentenary Sermon Sunday Mass was celebrated on April 3rd this year. The Church is of red brick construction with lime stone trim and has a capacity of about 720. Mr. H. Donald Byrne, architect, designed the new edifice which was constructed by First Selectman James J. Sullivan, contractor.



open for a few hours, two afteroons each week, but the increasing nterest on the part of the public created such a demand that the Directors voted to hold the library open on Saturday evenings after March 11, 1911. It was becoming more and more

apparent that the library was outgrowing that little corner room on the second floor of the old Town Hall. Where could they go? That was the problem before the Directors. After some investigation they considered the various locations hen available in East Haven, and was decided on December 2nd, 1911, to rent the Kirkham Building. How independent they considered themselves. No longer would they be imposing upon the Town of East Haven, but would be by themselves and no one could disturb them. Most likely only a few townsfolk now remember the little low onestory frame building in the rear of the Kirkham Building. This humble structure was divided into three coms; one a shoemaker shop, one occupied by a barber and the third room on the west end being at that time vacant. This commodious room about 12 by 14 feet in size was then to be the home of the East Haven Public Library for the next five years. The library was now truly under way. They leased this entire three-room building for a modest yearly rental and then subleased the quarters for the shoemaker and barber' thus receiving rom this source a small rental in come. Furthermore the legacy from

Time marched on. Another of received a second legacy. This be-Forbes and was to be used in purchasing a site for a library building.

The demands made by the public on this little civic organization grew so it became necessary for the Diectors to authorize the practice of he "seven day rule" for the newer nd more popular books. Furthermore with longer hours and increasing circulation, Miss Street was equired to secure assistance from some of the young men and women of the town in conducting the affairs of the busy little library.

The increasing interest upon the art of the young people of Eas Haven, largely due to Miss Street's ability to hold the admiration and respect of all young folk, resulted n the A. K. A. O. Society making donation of one hundred dollars on April 5th, 1913, to the library. This amount was deposited in a savings bank and only the interest used from year to year until December 28th, 1928, when permission was secured to spend the fund for the purchase of ten pictures, of historic buildings, to be placed in the library. The Bolero Hat
