MARCH OF DIMES

Throughout the country a great "March of Dimes" campaign is in progress in connection with the national Infants Paralysis drive for funds.

Bankers declare this feature of the campaign to be the greatest mass movement of coins in the history of the country.

From every little hamlet and crossroads, from village town and city, a great flood of ten cent pieces is converging on various campaign headquarters.

In many cities and towns March of Dimes buttons are being sold. School children in thousands of communities are contributing their dimes to the cause.

Business men may recall that although he has been reputed to wield great influence in the New Deal, he was not enthusiastic about NRA and was reputedly against the plan to enlarge the Court.

As the close of the campaign a final check-up will be made. If the people of a certain county in a certain state sent in \$20 in dimes to the White House a check for \$10 will be sent back to the chairman of that county to be added to the local fund which will be turned over to the nearest police captain as soon as it is established.

The March of Dimes plan grew out of the suggestion last year by Eddie Cantor, noted star of the radio, screen and stage, that citizens send a dime to the President as evidence of their support of the campaign.

Two centuries ago, thirteen little states, struggling along the east coast of the yet unexplored continent of North America, were just beginning to force themselves into a free nation.

Today the Goddess of Liberty engraved upon the dime has a new significance. The shining silver coins symbolize freedom to thousands of boys and girls who are bound, not by dependence upon a tyrannical mother country but by the ravaging after-effects of a terrible disease—infantile Paralysis.

MR. JUSTICE FRANKFURTER

Scarcely three months ago there appeared a book on "Mr. Justice Holmes and the Supreme Court." It was dedicated "To Mr. Justice Cardozo, my distinguished superior."

or to Mr. Justice Holmes? Now it appears that in all probability the author of that study, Prof. Felix Frankfurter, will become the logical successor of the United States Supreme Court to both Justice Holmes and Justice Cardozo.

At one time the designation of Mr. Frankfurter for a seat on the Supreme bench would have thrown a large part of the country into consternation.

Judging from public opinion, it certainly should not be left on the books in its present form. Everyone—with the exception of the C. I. O. and a few officials in Washington—seems to agree that in its present form it is not in the best interest of the public.

That public opinion favors doing something about the Act is undoubtedly due to the industrial strife the public has seen created by the hurriedly drafted law.

Why say the Act is responsible for industrial strife? Some may ask. The answer is that although it rightfully guarantees the privileges of employees, it fails to protect them or their employers from outside coercion—professional labor agitators, to be specific, and Communists who use labor as a vehicle for creating national bitterness.

The Dies Committee, created by the House of Representatives, has completed its work and made its report to the House on its findings regarding un-American activities in the United States.

No recommendation for legislation was made in the report which stated that the investigation had "only scratched the surface."

Only \$25,000 was spent for the probe just ended, and the committee reports that with two more years' time and additional funds, it could present important evidence of Communist, Fascist and other ism operations in America.

Unfortunately the American public is only vaguely aware that there are world forces working to overthrow America's form of government. The public has the right to know about these things and it is the duty of Congress to enact protective and remedial measures.

A step in that direction would be a continuance of this investigation which has only scratched the surface of a threatening but unseen force.

LET'S ALL WORK TOGETHER

A healthy state of economic affairs in America can be one of the strongest barriers against an infiltration of foreign spies into this country.

Foreign spies, which destroy religious and political liberties, have all had their root in economic distress and human misery. We should never forget that if all groups in the nation will work together toward the common objective of sound economic recovery the door will be shut abruptly in the face of ism-mongers who would undermine our institutions.
