East Haven To Dedicate Main Street Firehouse At Open House Saturday

First Hydrant Installed In 1892 And 500 Feet of Hose Purchased—Present Provisions Should Be Adequate For Many Years To Come.

Saturday afternoon and evening, Company No. 1 of the Fire Department will hold open house in its new firehouse in Main Street. The building committee is arranging a program which will be distributed to residents before the dedication. The committee consists of: Ray Goodwin, Minotte Sperry, Herbert Korn, Augustus Merrells and Chief Ernest Hanson who is chairman. The program at which the Selectman and the Board of Safety will officiate will start at 2:30 p. m. Many out-of-town visitors are expected. The engines and apparatus will be on exhibition.

Previous to 1892 the Town of East Haven was wholly dependent on the good will of one's neighbors and a bucket brigade in case of fire.

During the summer of 1892, following the burning of the Town Hall the selectmen purchased 500 feet of hose and installed a hydrant at Main and High Streets.

Seven years later two extension ladders were purchased and on January 2, 1900 the present fire department was organized.

Not until 1923 was it deemed necessary to purchase the first pumping engine.

Present officers are chief, Ernest P. Hanson; assistant chief, Frank H. Redfield; captain, Henry W. Andrews; first lieutenant, Hans J. (Continued on page seven)

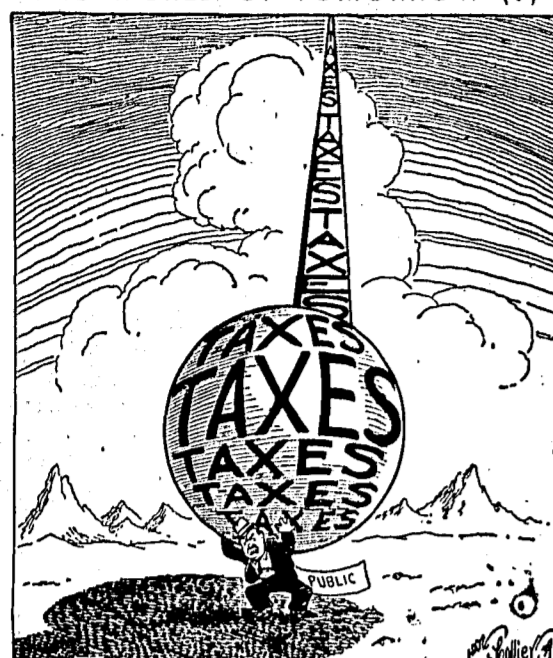
