Previous to 1892 the Town of East Haven was wholly dependent on the good will of one's neighbors and a bucket brigade in case of fire. During the summer of 1892, fol-lowing the burning of the Town

Hall the selectmen purchased 500 fiet of hose and installed a hydrant at Main and High Strets.

Seven years later two extension ladders were purchased and on January 2, 1900 the present fire department was organized.







To successfully displace the oily substance a liquid in which the sap is soluable or which will change its physical properties must be used according to the bulletin.






