Classing Of South School Brings Protests From Residents Of Districts

School Built 25 Years Ago When It Was Believed That End Of Town Would Flourish—Enrollment Steadily Decreasing.

Decision to close South School brings out petitions signed by property owners and residents along the Short Beach Road and Silver Sands sections of East Haven asking the Board of Education to reconsider its decision to close the school.

At its last meeting the board decided to close the school which was built in 1915 when it was expected that that end of town would develop.

Pupils, it is thought portable, will be transferred to Tuttle or Union Schools which brings about the matter of transportation.

The enrollment in the district has been dropping off in more recent years. Two teachers are employed at present but four grades are taught.

South School at one time took care of the whole southern part of town, but the erection of Momauguin School was partly responsible for the decrease in membership.

The board feels too that the system has reached the point where the school should be closed, in the interests of economy. The property is valued at \$17,592.

No disposition of the building has been announced by the Board of Education.

Reductions In Electric Bills Are Announced

Reductions in the electric bills of business firms and householders who use electricity in intermediate amounts were announced today by Mr. Wm. Sangster, manager of the Connecticut Light and Power Company in this territory. The new reductions, Mr. Sangster said, will save the customers affected \$204,000 yearly.

These rate decreases announced today apply both to commercial and household customers whose use of service is in the intermediate brackets. The bills of the commercial customers will be reduced \$144,000, while householders throughout the system who make a more-than-average use of electric service will have their bills lowered by a total of \$60,000 annually, bringing the total reduction to \$204,000.

Ten months ago the company reduced the bills of smaller-use household customers by \$600,000 annually. At that time the Area or Flat Charge was discontinued. Additional reductions totalling \$51,000 were subsequently made. Thus during the last ten months the customer's electric bills have been reduced by a total of \$855,000 yearly. The several rate reductions that the Connecticut Light and Power Company has made during the past eight years, Mrs. Sangster said, has cut down the bills of its customers by \$3,204,000 annually.

The application of the new reductions varies with the service requirements of the individual customer. The reductions are effective with the next bills rendered to the customers to whom they apply.

Nurses Waiting Results Of X-Ray

Of the 956 school children examined a few weeks ago by the Branford Visiting Nurse Association for indications of tuberculosis, 82 were found to be positive. Seventeen of that number have been X-rayed or are attended by their own physicians.

The remaining 65 are being X-rayed as rapidly as possible. Anxious parents are asked to be patient as it requires sometime to determine the results of the complete examination. Parents will be notified as soon as the information reaches the nurses here.

Before the examinations began in Branford it was considered likely that 25 per cent of the skin tests might prove positive. The actual number of positive cases proved a much lower percentage.

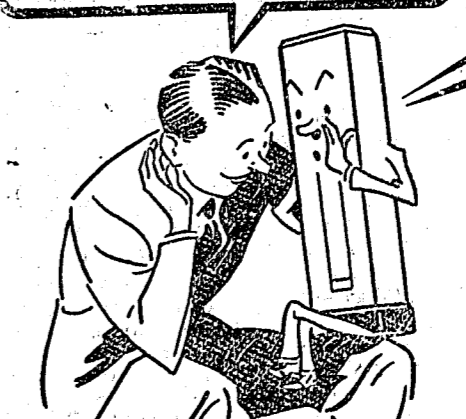

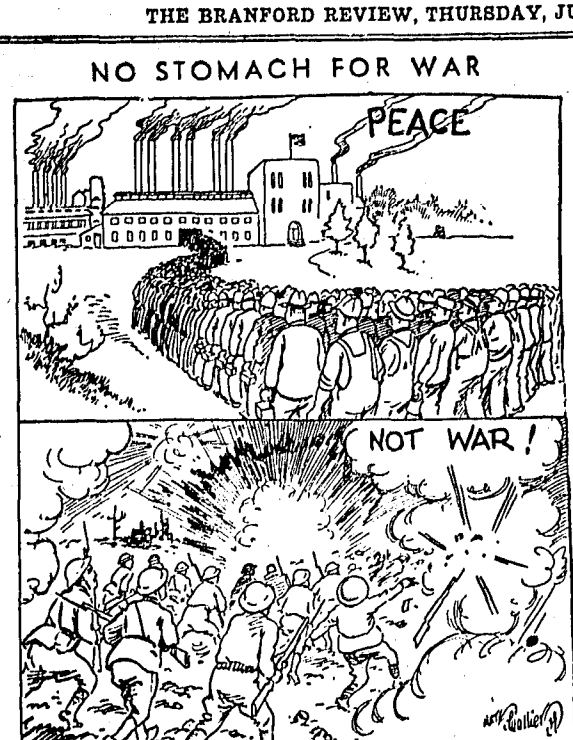

The Steel Foundry is planning to have a Track Team. George Torelli looks like the brightest prospect for Cross Country running.

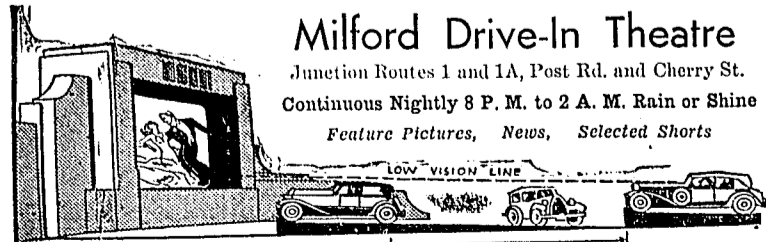
