# Two Railroad Employees Instantaneously Killed Near Montowese Viaduct

Thought Special Was Scheduled Train-Noise Of Automatic Tamping Machine Prevented Workman From January 8. Hearing Fast Approaching Express

Death rode the rails at approxi-President Ball mately 1:44 p. m. today when the Saybrook Express manned by Engineer W. S. Brainard of Wharton Street, West Haven, struck and killed John W. Doane of Westbrook, Conn., and Isadore Gomes of Stony Creek. Both men were employed by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

The men were working with a crew of five who were tamping gravel beneath the ties and failed to hear the train's warning whistle At the last moment they looked up and saw the express thundering upon them.
