





ADVICE FOR WAR TIMES First, remember that war is about e most expensive thing that was ever thought of. Though we are not officially in the war we are pledged help the allies with all our strength. That means that we will nave higer taxes, and fewer luxuries. Already they are talking curtailing the production of utomobiles. We will be lucky if we do not have "meatless days", and gasless days", and "sugarless days", etc. as we did in the first World War. It will be good if we take all of these things goodnaturedly and do not grumble. Let remember with gratitude that our country is comparatively safe rom the tragedies that have come to so many.
