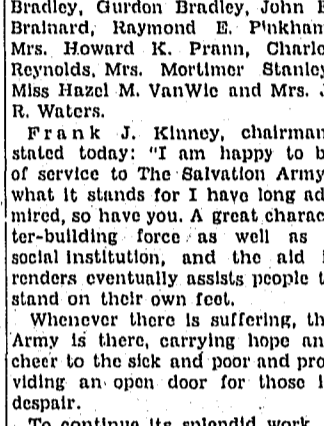

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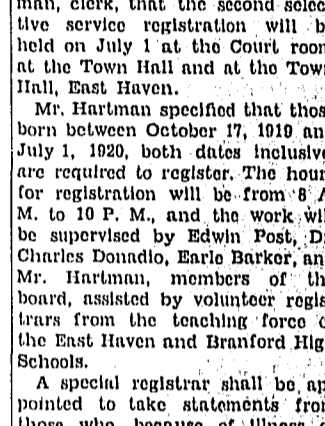

This figure was determined by a survey of 10,000 persons who answered last spring's advertising. No attempt was made to estimate the income received from those who did not answer the questionnaire.

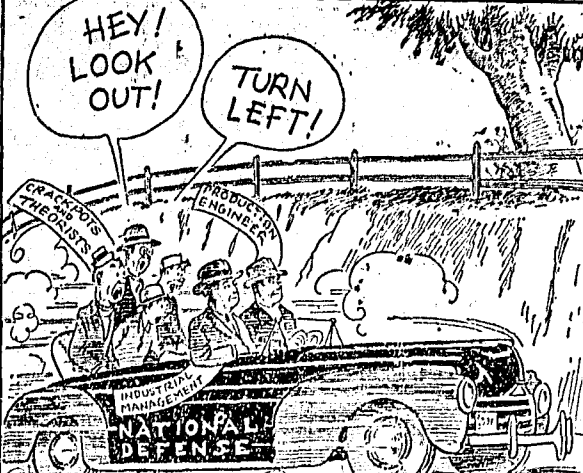

MEETING THE TEST AGAIN

The American automobile industry, during the greater part of the present century, proved itself a real leader in applying the idea of mass production to the widening distribution of jobs, payrolls and useful goods among the people of this country. Now, the record demonstrates, it is again showing leadership in facing the new situation created by our present defense leadership.
A few years ago, the manufacture of a passenger car depended almost exclusively upon materials which have today become, because of armament needs, "critical" or "strategic." But even then, with typical foresight, automobile companies were seeking out acceptable substitute for the materials then in use.

ONE CUP OF WATER

It has been said that one cup of water will put out any fire, if it's applied at the right time. This year's wave of defense strikes, culminating in the last of armed troops put a struck aviation plant back to work, inevitably recalls the old proverb.

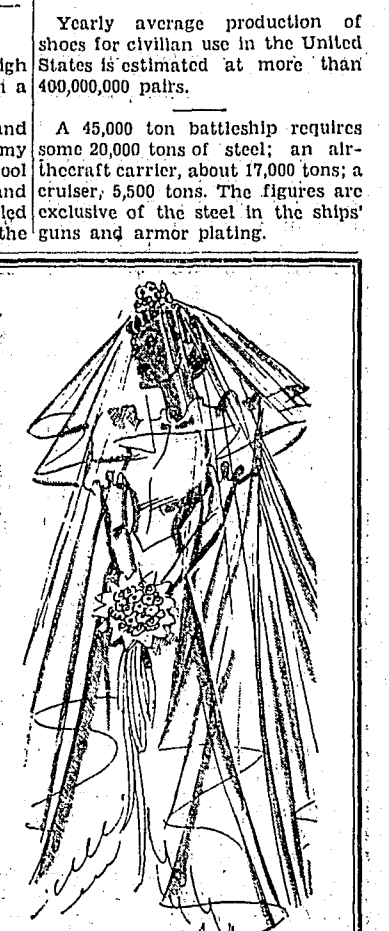
WASHINGTON SNAPSHOTS

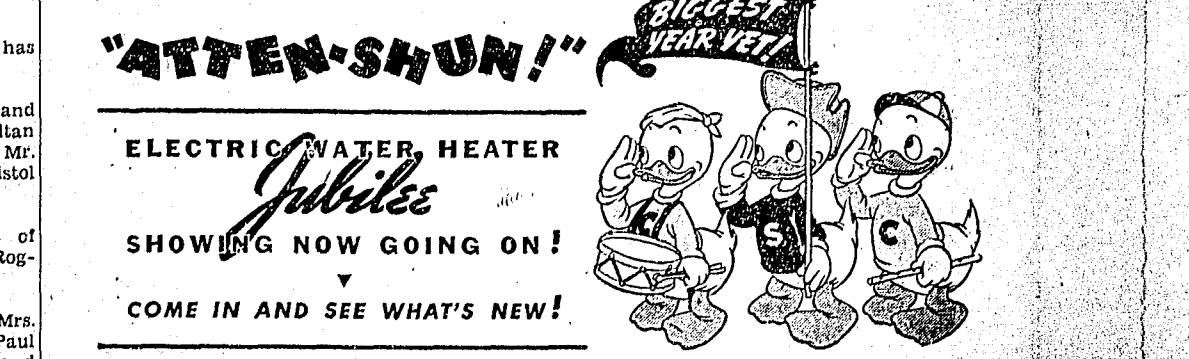

Station Wagon Owners Asked To Register

Do you own a station wagon? If so, are you willing to register it for use as an ambulance in the event of emergency? The safety promotion section of the Department of Motor Vehicles urges station wagon owners to list their cars for use as ambulances and states "It is conceivable such need might arise in Connecticut in connection with defense production. If, by reason of location or the extent of the disaster, a sufficient number of ambulances were not immediately available, police could draw on station wagons listed in that area for emergency use."

Copies of the forms to be filled out by persons wishing to have their station wagons listed are available at the business office of the Branford Review, Ross Street.

Some of the questions asked are: Telephone number; Station wagon could be picked up at; Does it open in rear or front; Is the vehicle you are volunteering insured as to public liability and property damage? If so, what are the limits? Could the operator drive or furnish an operator in the event the car had to be called for on very short notice? Has the person who would drive ever passed a Red Cross course in first aid; when; was the course standard, advanced or an instructor's course? If you are furnished with a Red Cross first aid kit, will you be responsible for it and keep it in the vehicle at all times? If you could not arrange to have someone who is interested in making gauze dressings for our own boys in camps, come to the Library audience every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

If there are any men or women interested to take the course who have not already handed in their names kindly telephone 324. Anyone over sixteen years of age is eligible.

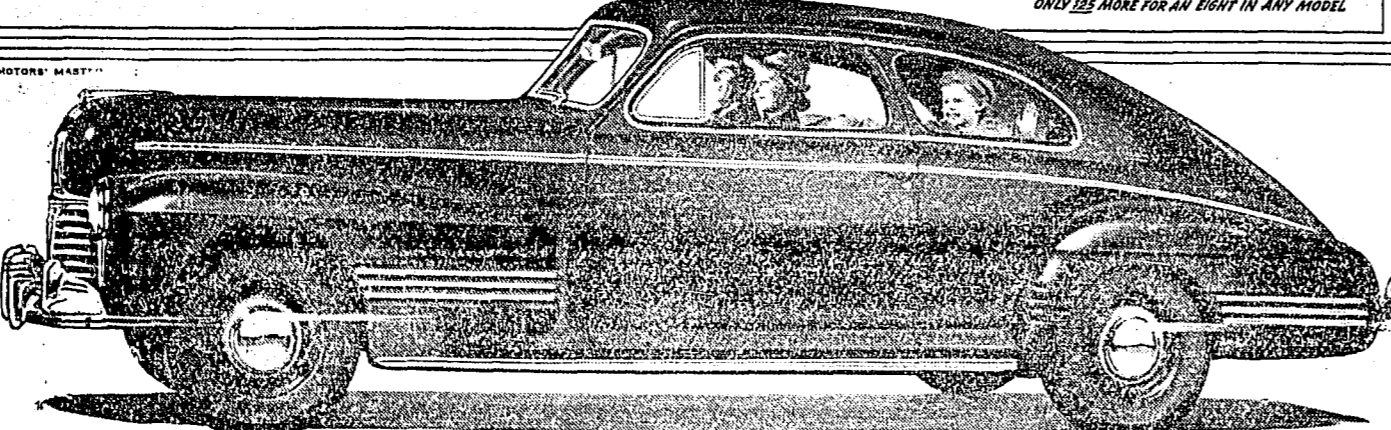
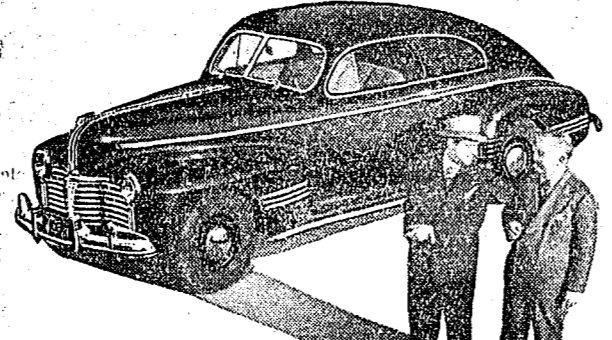

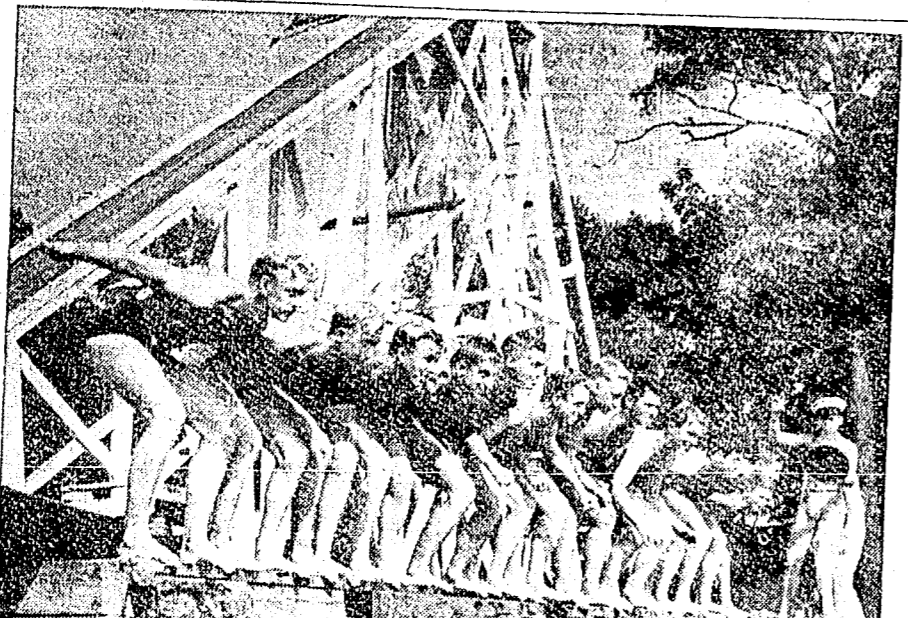
Locals New Infield Raises Pennant Hopes

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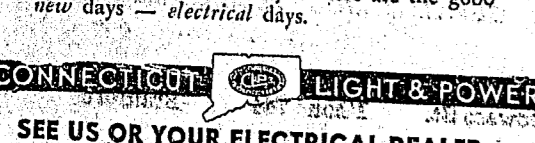

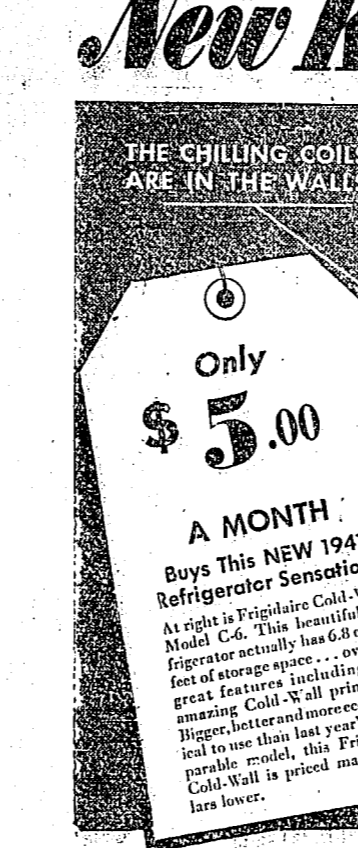

VACATIONS AND PETS.

In a statement issued today, Reed W. Hitchcock, director of the Animal Department of the Connecticut Humane Society, appealed to all animal owners to give thought to the care of their pets in planning their summer's vacation.

Mr. Hitchcock pointed out that if the pet cannot be taken on the vacation, a homelike boarding place should be found where good care will be assured while the owner is away. It is a mistaken idea he said, that animals accustomed to a good home and regular care can look out for themselves while the family is gone. They may manage to exist, but will be wretched and unhappy and will return again and again to the house, waiting patiently for the family to come home.

It was suggested that if it became necessary to dispose of a pet before leaving home for the summer the Humane Society is willing and equipped to do this in the easiest and most suitable way possible. However, Mr. Hitchcock said, do not put this off until the last moment but have it done several days in advance of the family's departure, preferably on a day other than Friday, Saturday or Monday, for on these days the Society has more calls from people going on vacation than can be possibly handled.

In concluding, Mr. Hitchcock stated that every precaution should be taken for the pet's safety and well-being during the Fourth of July holidays. All parents, he said, should urge their children to refrain from using fireworks near animals as the explosions will frighten them and sometimes result in viciousness.

Mr. and Mrs. Harris left for a southern motor trip. The latter wore a printed apple green and white redingote, a white hat with apple

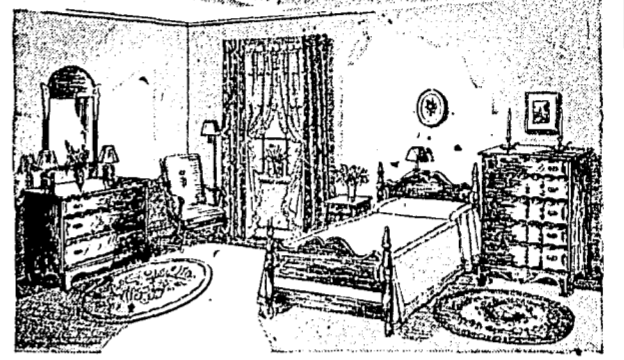
green veiling and corsage of gardenias. They will be at home in Stoke, Aldie, Va.
