## Legal Notice

### NOTICE TO THOSE LIABLE TO PAY OLD AGE ASSISTANCE TAXES:

The tax collector wishes to call attention to the fact that a large number of taxpayers failed to pay their old age assistance tax during the month of February, 1941. The law requires that these taxes be paid, and the Town has to pay the State its proportion even if they are not collected. The old age pensions are paid from this money and everyone agrees this is a most worthy object.

The law provides that if these taxes are not paid, the tax collector shall turn over the names of such delinquent taxpayers to the prosecuting attorney who shall issue a complaint and cause such delinquent taxpayer to be arrested and brought before the court. This of course will result in additional costs which will have to be paid by the taxpayer.

The tax collector therefore urges all taxpayers who are delinquent to see that these taxes are paid before December 1, 1941, because after that date the law will be complied with and warrants issued.
