Helen Barnett Resigns As Welfare Supervisor To Work For Red Cross

Board of Selectmen Appoints Mrs. Constance T. Myers of Indian Neck to Fill Vacancy — Mrs. Barnett Came Here Eight Years Ago To Establish Department.

Effective as of March 1, Mrs. Helen Barnett has given her resignation to the Board of Selectmen. She will serve the American Red Cross as field representative. Beginning the first of March she will leave for New York for a brief stay. From there she will receive instructions in Virginia and Washington, D. C. before assuming her duties. The Board of Selectmen has ap-

pointed Mrs. Constance T. Myers of Indian Neck to replace her. Mrs. Myers spent about six years with the State Bureau of Child Welfare and then entered the employ of the New Haven Children's Center. For a brief time she worked with the New Haven Department of Charity.

dard of efficiency and service of the community and has gained recognition elsewhere as one of the best small town welfare departments of the state". .

She referred perhaps, to recent announcements made by Mrs. Alice Cowgill and Miss Eleanor Little that they rated the local department as a model for other towns.

"While work of the welfare department is not a conspicious part of town government" Mrs. Barnett added. "It is certainly a very essential part and I trust that Branford sees fit to continue the same high taandard of service and efficiency through future years."

After graduating from Mount Holyoke Mrs. Barnett attended and received her masters degree at the Simmons School of Social Service. Later she served as a medical social worker and then put in three

years of veteran hospital work.
