Memorial Observance Begins With Assembly At 9 O'clock Saturday

Legion Members Gather at 6:30 to Visit Graves — Men on Furlough Invited to Parade — Mothers of Service Men Given Special Attention by Civilian Defense.

The committee on arrangements for the observance of Memorial Day held its final meeting at the armory Monday night. Louis Mory representing the Spanish veterans, is chairman of the committee.

American Legion members will assemble at the Armory at 6:30 to decorate the graves, sound taps and go to Stony Creek for 8 o'clock Memorial services.

All units of the parade will assemble at the armory promptly at 9 o'clock Saturday morning and the parade will start from that point. William Kremsler, commander of the American Legion post, will be marshal, and Louis Mory will be honorary marshal.

The parade will be composed of two units and the first section will be divided into two divisions. The following will be in the line: Division A — Police escort, marshal and aides, high school band; Company I, Connecticut State Guard; American Legion; Sons of the Legion; Spanish War Veterans; American Legion Auxiliary; Sidney Beach Camp Auxiliary; Women's Relief Corps.

Division B
Among the groups expected to parade under Civilian Defense banners are volunteer office forces, air raid wardens, auxiliary firemen, auxiliary police, medical services, utility and repair crews, vital records and first aiders.

Mothers and wives of men in service are especially asked to join this section.

The second section will include the Stony Creek Drum Corps, Red Men, Fire Departments, Rona Society, St. John the Baptist Society, Club Pack, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and school children.

After parading through the principal streets the parade will terminate at the monument on the Green where the following exercises will be held:

Invocation, Rev. Edward Demensky; song by school children, with special numbers arranged by Miss Angelica Caraballo, music supervisor; services for the G.A.R.; Women's Relief Corps services; Sidney Beach Camp, U.S.W.V. services; American Legion services; Gettysburg Address by Frank J. Kinney; song by school children; principal address by the Rev. George Dickson Owen of the First Congregational Church; placing of wreaths; passing of colors; Star Spangled Banner by the band; firing squad; benediction by the Rev. Frederic R. Murray.

Members of the armed forces who are home on furlough are invited to join the parade.

History Tells Of War Of 1812

Branford, like New England was not too enthusiastic about the War of 1812, and disapproved of Pres. Madison's Embargo and Non-Inter-course Acts which preceded that conflict.

In 1808, on September 19, the town expressed its disapproval. Voted that George Hoadley, Jared Bradley, Samuel Junr, Orchard Gould, Capt. Isaac Foot Capt. Thought Given To Attracting Summer Guests

Association Emphasizes What Can Be Done, Rather Than What Cannot Be Done.

Sidney A. Edwards managing director of the Connecticut Development Commission, indicated Friday night at the Town Hall that it was still uncertain how war-time restrictions would affect the State's summer tourist business, but urged shore town businessmen to exert every effort to attract vacationing visitors.

In an address before the Shore Line Association here, Edwards pointed out that more than one-third of the State's 169 towns derived an important part of their revenue from summer trade. The towns fronting Long Island Sound from East Haven to Waterford relied particularly on summer visitors to bolster the tax rolls he said.

"We accept without question," Edwards asserted, "the necessity for certain restrictions upon our activities in recreation areas. Neverthe-

Local Theatre Plans To Sell Bonds, Stamps

Headed by government, state and city officials, motion picture executives from both chains and independent theatres throughout Connecticut and Massachusetts held a special meeting in the ballroom of the Taft Hotel Tuesday afternoon to discuss ways and means for the sale of war bonds and stamps in the various motion picture theatres throughout the two states. It was officially announced last night by I. J. Hoffman, division manager of Warner Brothers Theatres and Harry F. Shaw, division manager of Loew Pox New England Theatres who are serving as co-chairmen of the Connecticut committee.

Plans have been in discussion for several weeks to inaugurate the sale of war bonds and stamps in the various motion picture theatres starting on May 20th and it is the plan to keep these theatres both open continuously day and night for the duration. Already 15,000 motion picture theatres including the Branford Theatre, throughout the country have signified their intention of co-operating one hundred per cent in this new sales venture.

This evening in the library at 8:30 a sound motion picture program will be given to which there is no charge. Pictures will include Battle Front Commandos in Action, Dog Show, Hitler's Lambeth Walk and News in the Air. A collection will be taken for the benefit of the emergency casualty station at Indian Neck.

Red Cross Motor Corps Equipped For Emergency

The Red Cross Motor Corps of the Branford Branch is equipped with an 18-unit First Aid Kit, purchased by each Motor Corps member. In addition to this, a 10-unit kit, a new Victory stretcher, blankets and splints are furnished solely by the Red Cross and by no other agency, to be used by the Motor Corps personnel assigned to each of the seven Emergency Stations.

Previously, the Red Cross equipped six of the seven Emergency First Aid Stations with compresses, cotton, bandages, etc. The compresses for the Owenega House are now being made in the Red Cross gauze dressings room at the Blackstone Library and will be placed with all the other supplies which have been bought, by the Red Cross. Recently the Motor Corps was presented with three metal traction splints.

Land Army Asked To Pick Berries

Local farmers estimate they need 43 workers for the coming strawberry season which is expected to start at least by June 10th.

By arrangements with Mr. Norcross of the 4-H and Mrs. Alsop of the State Civilian Defense Land Army plans are being made to bring at least 43 Connecticut workers here.

Mrs. Charles Hooghkirk and Mrs. Ernest Craig representing the local Land Army working under the Women's Division of Civilian Defense have been holding meetings and conversations with the Farm Bureau and local farmers to complete arrangements which include housing and feeding the workers.

Farmers will also require the usual services of local berry pickers. This is one of the first, if not the first venture in the state of this sort and will be used as a test to determine its use in later harvests.

Dr. George M. Smith of Pine Orchard, research associate in anatomy, at the Yale School of Medicine and medical member of State Defense Council, has been named president-elect of the Connecticut State Medical Society.

Dr. Smith was named to this post at a meeting of the house of delegates of the society this week in Hartford. He will take office at the meeting of the society in June, and will succeed Dr. Roy L. Leak, superintendent of the Middletown State hospital, who becomes president this year. The incumbent is Dr. James D. Gold, of Bridgeport.

Pledge Signing Is Nearly Over

The task of signing up 2700 persons to pledge to buy War Savings Stamps and Bonds in Branford has met with pleasant success with much of the territory still un-covered.

Mrs. Wilfred T. Nott, chairman of canvassers, asks that any who have not been approached and who come near the vicinity of the Toole building stop at the Sno-Vor-Victory headquarters and secure a pledge.

Chairman Reginald Baldwin reminds residents that stamps and bonds purchased out of town are not credited to Branford.

Dorothy Kearney First To Enlist

Miss Dorothy Kearney of Sea Hill Road, North Branford, had the distinction yesterday of being the first volunteer in New Haven to enlist for the Women's Auxiliary of the U. S. Army.

Miss Kearney headed the line which formed in the U. S. recruiting station at 341 State Street, New Haven, before eight o'clock in the morning. She is applying for officers' training in the W.A.A.C.

All applications for the officers' training for women must be submitted to the recruiting station by June 5. After June 5, it is expected that recruiting for "buck privates" will commence.

Of all the thousands of women applying for the officers' training, 450 candidates will be selected to report for duty at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, about July 15.

It has been stated by the Government that "every woman placed in a non-combatant military job will free a man for active combat service." The women will be placed in various kinds of jobs such as clerks, machine operators, telephone and telegraph operators, dicticians, hostesses, accountants, cooks, and bakers.

Check-list voting at the special town meeting held last evening in the Community House found 183 voters in favor of rescinding the action of the April 7 town meeting, which voted to establish a zoning authority by a 40 to 40 standing vote. Of the 326 votes cast, 140 upheld the April action.

Joseph Driscoll was chosen Moderator and Reginald S. Baldwin presented the resolution to repeal the amendment establishing the zoning commission.

Town Council T. Holmes Brackton and Howard Whiting spoke at length in favor of zoning, looking ahead to the future protection of Branford, and urged that, in all fairness, a zoning authority be given a fair trial. They both pointed out that zoning and building codes are in no way the same, and that no fees or paid jobs are the outcome of zoning.

By consent of the floor, a representative of the State Planning Commission, Mr. Shurtleff, spoke. He was introduced as probably being the best authority on the subject of zoning in the United States. He told of misconceptions and misunderstandings and verified that zoning was a poor man's insurance against the whims of his neighbor.

Frederick O'Reilly, Robert Mertz, John Barnes and D. W. Owens were among those who were given the floor to urge that the previous vote for zoning be rescinded.

There was some confusion as to the method of voting so the moderator called for a showing of hands, asking Mr. Brackton, Mr. Barnes, Mr. Baldwin and Alexander Murphy to count. Because of a large standing attendance this was unsatisfactory, so it was decided to ballot by check list.

The deciding vote, therefore, abolished the zoning commission which was established at the town meeting of April 7. Branford will remain unzoned.

First Aid Teams Asked To Enter Annual Contest

Commissioner Edward J. Hickey, General Chairman of the Second Annual Statewide First Aid Contest to be held at Trinity College, Hartford, on June 27, announced today the creation of a novice class in the First Aid Contest, which is to be the feature of the day's program.

In addition, there will be classes for industry, police and fire men, and crack first aid groups. Ladies are especially invited to compete and mixed teams consisting of both men and women members are also eligible. Suitable prizes will be awarded.

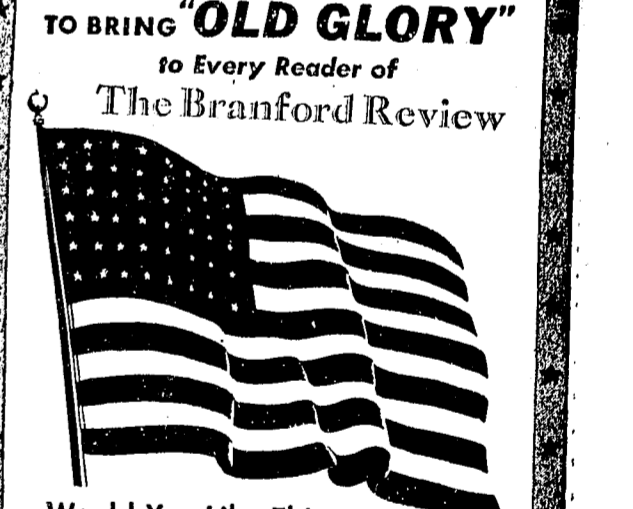

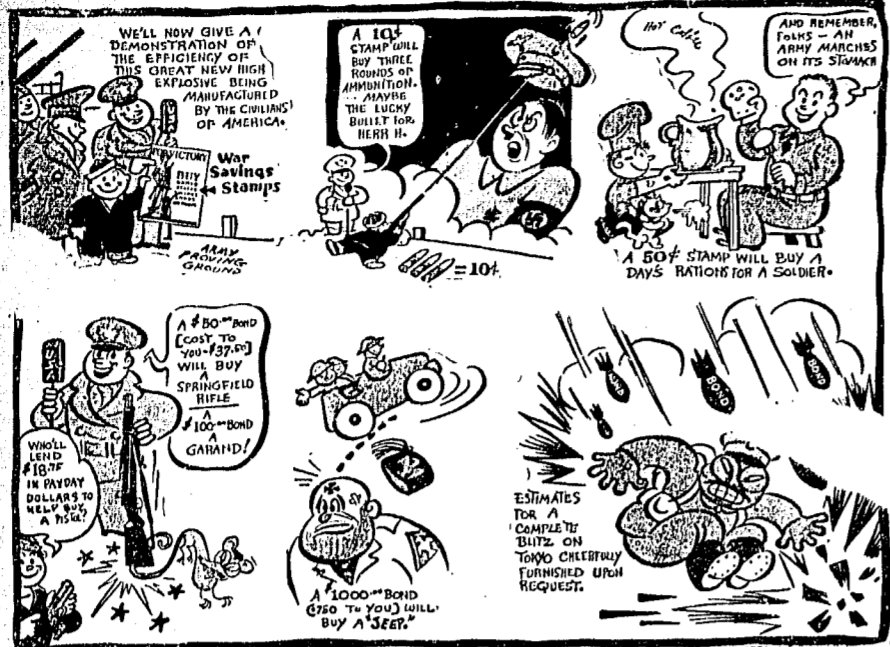

In Windsor Locks, a clubhouse is ready for men from Bradley Field. There are also USO units in Hartford and Bridgeport and citizens committees have been set up in many communities. Plans are also underway for construction of a railroad station lounge in New Haven.
