### V-Mail Service Instructions Have Arrived

Operation of the V-Mail Service is based upon the use for correspondence to and from our armed forces abroad of a special, standard, uniform, and distinctive V-Mail letter sheet.

Details were received here by Postmaster Joseph Driscoll. The correspondence side of the V-Mail letter sheet is so arranged as to allow the largest possible space for the message which may be typewritten or written with dark ink or pencil.

Because of the distinctive identification and uniformity of size, this mail will receive preferred and expeditious handling.

To further expedite this V-Mail destined overseas, there will be inaugurated a photographic micro-filing facility by using specialized machines on 16 millimeter films.

Every possible bit of shipping space must be conserved so that our armed forces will be assured that all shipping is devoted to the carrying of vital military supplies.

As a result of this operation, 150,000 V-Mail letters, after filming, will weight 45 pounds and occupy space for one sack of mail.

At destination the receiving station will reproduce and enlarge the message for delivery.

### Rationing Board Issues Notices

Retailers of this area are notified by Frederick Houde, Clerk of the Branford Rationing Board No. 7-14 that price lists of cost of living commodities as defined in general maximum price registration must be filed with their local war price and rationing board by July 1st.

Anyone entitled to additional sugar for canning purposes may apply for rationing at the office in the Sval building. Rhubarb is regarded as a fruit in home canning. Sugar for canning sweet pickles may be allowed on the basis of one pound, per annum, per person. Coupon No. 5 is good from June 28 to July 25 and is good for two pounds of sugar.

On and after July 15 no gasoline can be brought by consumers except in exchange of gas coupons. Dealers will be able to replenish their supplies only with required exchange coupons. Cars will carry windshield stickers to indicate type card the owner holds.

### Group Of Men Of Draft Age Will Register

All male persons who were born on or after January 1, 1922 and on or before June 30, 1924 (except those exempt) must present themselves for registration with the Selective Service Board on June 30, between the hours of 7 A. M. and 9 P. M., E.W.T.

Branford men will appear in the Selective Service Room, second floor Toole Building where Frank Hartman, Cornelius Driscoll, and John Lonergan will be in charge.

The East Haven town hall will be open the same hours with Edwin Post, Dr. Charles Donofrio and Miss Barbara Hall as registrars.

### Children Help Rubber Cause

Seth W. Darley, chairman of the Connecticut Petroleum Industries Committee says that service station operators throughout Connecticut are supporting President Roosevelt's rubber salvage campaign 100 percent.

Locally, service stations continue to receive rubber. Children especially, are helping by house to house calls, bringing in anything from pencil erasers to tires and tubes.

Darley states that although the work of the service station operators was vital to the success of the drive, it can only succeed if the public, realizing the great and serious need of rubber, respond wholeheartedly and brings in every last bit of discarded rubber that they can possibly lay their hands on. It may be found in garages, in barns, in their attics, or their cellars, or in a refuse pile, or almost anywhere. Old tires, tubes, garden hoses, hot water bottles, tennis shoes, raincoats, bathing caps, rubber toys, etc. are only a few of the miscellaneous rubber items that can be found if the public searches diligently for them.

We only have to June 30th to do this tremendously important job, and no one, anywhere, knows how much scrap rubber can be found in Connecticut, but if the people of the State make an effort to dig out every scrap of rubber that they can find, there is no reason why Connecticut cannot be well in the lead in the drive.

The service station operators are volunteering their time and service to this patriotic effort and they will pay 1c per pound for every rubber article brought to them.

### Dietician Tells Rotarian Club About Foods

"Scanty, ill-cooked food depraves the blood by weakening the blood-making organs. ### Delegation Goes To Toronto, Can.

With 7,000 Rotarians and members of their families present from more than a score of countries, the 33rd annual convention of Rotary International opened, in a colorful ceremony, by His Excellency, the Earl of Athlone, Governor General of Canada, and his wife, the Princess Alice.

Despite wartime travel restrictions in Canada and in the United States, and the difficulties of traveling from other countries to North America, delegates at the convention represented the majority of the 210,000 Rotarians who are members of 5,000 Rotary clubs in some 50 countries of the world. Rotarians already in attendance at the convention have come from Argentina, Australia, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Colombia, Cuba, Ecuador, England, Egypt, Guatemala, Hawaii, Lebanon, Mexico, Nicaragua, Panama, Palestine, Peru, Puerto Rico, South Africa, Switzerland, the United States Uruguay and Venezuela. This "Congress of Nations" is not only an indication of Rotary's internationality but also of the soundness of its principles which are based on the belief that differences of race or of creed or of nationality need not necessarily serve as barriers to keep men from being friends.

### Superior Court Judge Frank P. McEvoy reserved decision Tuesday following a hearing on the Town of East Haven's petition upon complaint of Health officer Dr. Robert M. Taylor, for a temporary injunction to prevent operation of a piggery in Strong Street, which is alleged to be a nuisance.

Judge McEvoy today refused a temporary injunction but issued a mandatory order compelling Melillo to make certain improvements to his property in accordance with suggestions made by a state official. These are to be corrected by July 10.

The court said, "To grant this injunction at this time would seriously injure the defendant. There are other piggeries in the vicinity without injury to adjoining residents."

The piggery is operated by Pasquale and Adeline M. Melillo of 32 Edwards Street, Hamden, who hold contracts for collection of garbage in Hamden and in New Haven.

Town Counsel Edward L. Reynolds represented the town and William F. Geenty appeared for the town and 44 neighboring property holders, while the Melillos were represented by Vincent P. Dooley and John McNeerney.

The town charges several hundred pigs are kept in the piggery in an unclean condition, that the place is a nuisance, unhealthy and unsanitary, by a serious annoyance to residents of the neighborhood and has resulted in decreasing values of nearby properties.

Melillo took the witness stand during the afternoon and denied the charges brought by the town, contending he keeps the piggery in a sanitary condition and follows instructions and advice given him. He admitted under cross examination that he only started construction of a large feeding platform May 30. Supt. of Parks Wirth testified that the golf course was effected by the smell and two real estate men appeared to say that property values had gone down-hill since the operation of the piggery.

Appearing to testify also was E. G. Brennan who manages the Daley piggery. He was of the opinion that such a business can be operated without giving offense.

Recommendations made in February had not been carried out by the May inspection Edward Noonan of the Sanitary Department of the State Department of Health said.

When questioned, Health officer Taylor said he repeatedly found heaps of uncovered pig manure, decayed garbage and filth that created such a fly menace that in warm weather is was almost unbearable.

Board Receives Call To Supply 1-B Registrants

Those Called In August Will Be Assigned Limited Military Service To Relieve Others For Actual Combat Duty With The Armed Forces.

Connecticut has received its first call to furnish the armed forces with men classified as 1-B Major William P. Averill, Acting State Director for Selective Service, announced.

Local boards will receive from State Headquarters, about July 1, the call to supply the 1-B men during August. It will be in addition to the regular call for 1-A registrants for that month.

Although 1-B quota is confidential information, the Acting State Director admitted that while the call is issued there are a sufficient number of registrants, Class 1-B, at present, to meet this and future calls.

Receipt of the call for 1-B registrants was welcomed by Major Averill, who pointed out that thousands of Connecticut registrants, ready and willing to serve with the armed forces, have been denied minor physical disabilities in the past and hundreds will doubtless be volunteered when the public is advised that provisions have been made by the Army to use them for limited military service.

Selective Service regulations designed 1-B men as registrants who are because of minor physical defects are not available for general military service. This will include many men heretofore rejected by the Army induction stations because of eyesight, insufficient teeth, under or overweight, and other minor defects.

Practically every local board in the State has a large number of 1-B registrants available who have previously had a physical examination by the Army and were returned rejected with the advice that they should be placed in 1-B. These registrants will be among the first to be called, Director Averill pointed out.

Registrants classified as 1-B and called for service in August will be assigned to limited military service. 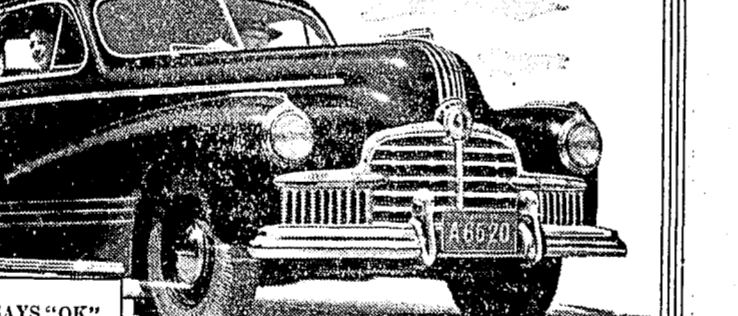

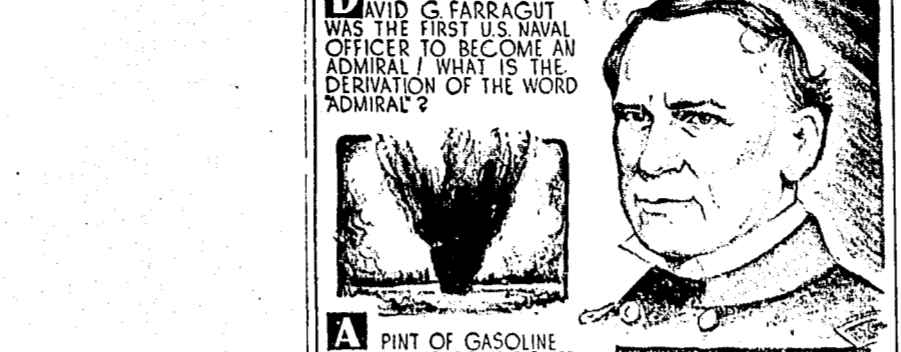

The federal government, in order to make available vital materials for the production of war weapons, has drastically curtailed the manufacture of electric appliances. In a majority of cases the production has been entirely stopped, especially that of large home appliances.

Some of these new appliances now in dealers' stocks may be purchased, for domestic use, according to government regulations that vary with the different appliances. New electric water heaters can be bought without special requirements, provided they can be installed according to regulations now in effect. Vacuum cleaners are readily obtainable, there being no restrictions on their sale. Electric refrigerators, on the other hand, cannot be obtained for domestic operation except with high priority rating such as applies to war housing contracts, hospitals, etc.

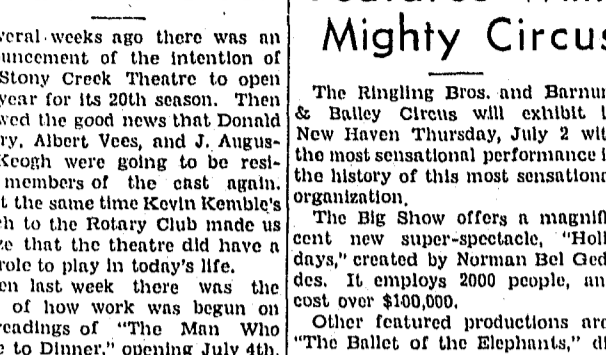

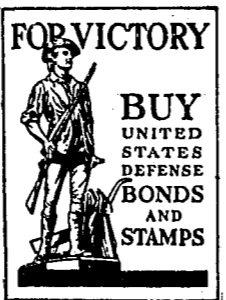

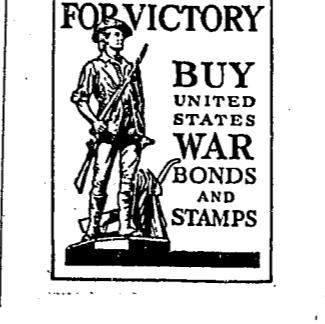
