A BIT ABOUT LAKE SALTONSTALL

From Mr. Minor of the New Haven Water Company we learned a few interesting facts the other day about Lake Saltonstall. The Lake had been getting lower and lower through the summer as the worst drought in years went on week after week, and yet the surface of the Lake had fallen only three feet up to a week ago when rain came. He told us that not only had the dry weather and lack of rain-fall made heavy demands upon the Lake but that the two new electric pumps have been at work sixteen to eighteen hours every day, pumping approximately four and a half million gallons of water daily into the supply lines which bring water into our homes and those of neighboring communities.

There are hundreds of people in East Haven who have never see the upper Lake, that is the part that lies above the New Haven Railroad tracks. Since wartime the Lake has been closed to the publie, and prior to that, it was open only during limited periods for those who wanted to fish for bass and pickerel in the upper reaches. The Lake is between two and a half and three miles long, and old timers declare it is so deep that soundings have not reached bottom in some parts. Mr. Minor questions the old tales that the Lake is fed by inexhaustible subteramian springs, yet its only inlet is man-made, a long diversion tunnel under the hills to the north, which carries into the Lake a part of the flow of Farm River from a point near River street in Foxon. The surface of the Lake could drop nine feet from normal without hindering flow of water into the pumps.

A half century or more ago the Lake was the scene of crew races between Yale and Harvard. Until 1900 or thereabouts the Lake and surrounding countryside was on amusement park famous throughout the state. On its quiet waters rode the Cygnet and Swan, two launches brought to East Haven from the World's Fair in Chicago. There was also a barge, the Governor Saltonstall, which carried pleasure parties to the various landings and pienic grounds. In winter, when the Lake froze over, skating parties came from far and near. In those days there was a railroad station on the shore of the lake and, by railroad there was a rannoad station on the shore of the lake and, by rannoad train, cafe excursion parties from many distant points. A trolley line was also operated to the Lake in the Gay Nineties, leaving Main street near the Green and running through what is now Saltonstall Manor to the Lake.

When the New Haven Water Company acquired the Lake, it soon afterward installed the late Louis Anthonis as caretaker and watchman, and he became a favorite and familiar figure to the the boys and girls miles away from town; sportsmen who visited the Lake each summer during the fishing season. He maintained a boathouse and a number of fishing craft and

knew all the favorite fishing places. Mr. Minor told us that Lake Saltonstall has proven one of the best of the supply lakes hereabouts this year, second only to the giant-Lake Gaillurd in North Branford.

He reported to Newport, R. I., for boot training and at its conclusion went to Yeoman's School in Toledo, Ohio. When he finished that phase of his training he reported back to New port where he picked up his ship, the ill-fated Warrington.


