One of the necessary functions of a Chamber of Commerce, a Trade Association, or a Business Men's Organization is the protection of its members from loss of money through unauthorized solicitations. In cities and towns where such organizations have been formed by the business people working together through a secretary and committees, solicitations for advertising or "donations" of one "donations" of one kind or another are carefully scrutinized. If the "cause" is found to be an unworthy one it is frowned upon and authorization to solicit members is not approved. This, we believe, is another reason why we should have a live organization of our business people functioning in East Haven. Many solicitors of funds for advertising or for donations have a convincing and pursuading story to tell to the individual merchant or business man. But quite often that which they sell or that for which they seek funds is out of all proportion to the money they collect. Some solicitors do their work over the telephone. These are the kind that should be particularly scrutinized. Quite often the buyer of advertising does so on a basis of misinformation. When solicitors know they must face an alert secretary or businessmen's committee they steer clear of the members. Advertising is a legitimate and worthwhile expenditure in any business.
