BATHING IN FARM RIVER

Dr. Ovilda Grennon, our acting health officer, tells us that samples of water taken from Farm River show that the water is polluted and that therefore bathing in the river is hazardous. In the interest of public health in East Haven he has issued a warning that bathing in this stream should not be indulged in.

It would seem that with such a warning parents would make certain that their children cease this dangerous practice. Warm days this summer have brought many youngsters to the swimming holes along the stream but in view of the contamination and polution this bathing should be halted at once even if police action may be neces sary. With infantile paralysis a summertime malady, and with the possibility that polluted water may have something to do with the spread of this dangerous disease, it is all the more essential that Dr. Grenon's warning be heeded without delay.

We would suggest, too, that some effort be made to clear up the

causes of pollution. It ought not to be too difficult because what pollution exists enters Farm River within the confines of East Haven Farm River has its origin up above Northford in Pistapaug Pond which is the source of water supply for the town of Wallingford. The entire course of Farm River through Northford and North Branford is protected from contamination under the direction of the State Health Department because water from Farm River is diverted through a tunnel under Saltonstall Mountain to Lake Saltonstall which is a source of water supply for New Haven and surrounding towns. The contamination and pollution which has been found here enters the stream somewhere below Foxon and it would be well we believe if it were discontinued.

VISITING IN THE COUNTRY


PROMOTING THE HOME TOWN
