McDowell, wife of Dr. McDowell, pastor of the Dixwell avenue Congregational church. Mrs. Deming will speak on the Fair Employment Bill, and Mrs. McDowell will tell of her husband's note-worthy

work among the native Africans of Angola, and will also give a sketch of James Aggrey, Gold Coast native, who received his ph. D degree from Columbia University. He was the only African Negro to be made a member of the two Phelps Stokes Commissions on African education, and became vice president of the British-built \$3,000,000 Achinota College at Accra, Gold Coast, Africa. The meeting will be held in the Church Hall and all interested are cordially invited. Tea will be served.

**Harry Bartlett Post Auxiliary Will Be 25 Years Old Sunday**

A little item in our "Down Memory Lane" column this week strikes a nostalgic chord in the minds of many East Haveners when it reminds us that the Women's Auxiliary of Harry R. Bartlett post, American Legion, has reached its twenty-fifth birthday.

Mrs. Mabel Michaels of Tuttle place, president of the organization, tells us that it was on the evening of Thursday, February 24, 1921 that the auxiliary was organized. The little group which started out that winter night with sixteen charter members, has become one of the town's best known groups, with a present membership of over eighty women.

East Haven was just digging itself out from the worst snow storm in nearly two decades, the night the

little band of wives, mothers and relatives of East Haven men who had seen service in the War which had ended Nov. 11, 1918 assembled to organize. The snow storm had pelted down on East Haven on the previous Sunday and Monday and huge drifts were piled deep all over the town. That was the time, long after remembered when street cars did not come through from New Haven to East Haven for three days. In fact the trolleys were operating for the first time the day two days after Washington's Birthday, when the pioneers of the American Legion auxiliary ventured forth from their homes in the early evening, to organize.

The American Legion post itself had been organized only a year before and was struggling through its first year handicapped by insufficient quarters and equipment. A small back room in a building which stood in the rear of the present Metcalf Drug Store had been given over to the veterans for their meetings. And it was in these cramped quarters, heated by a small coal stove, that the ladies launched the Auxiliary. A group consisting of wives, mothers and relatives of the veterans had been working industriously toward supplying furnishings for the post rooms the previous few months, and it was this group that formed the nucleus for the new organization. At the organization meeting the

guest speaker was Donald Peck, first commander of the Bartlett post, who was present to thank the ladies for the work they had been doing and to encourage them in their desire to form an auxiliary. He told of work which had been done along these lines in other communities and commended them for their interest in the welfare of the veterans.

Mrs. Will Chidsey was elected as the first president of the Auxiliary. The Charter Members 16 in all included Mrs. Minnie Bartlett, Mrs. Catherine Norwood, Mrs. Charles Norwood, Mrs. Ida M. Cowles, Mrs. C. E. Turner, Mrs. H. Isabel Peck, Mrs. Ida P. Fairchild, Mrs. Hattie F. Fairchild, Hattie A. Chidsey, Nellie L. Chidsey, Hilja R. Chidsey, Mabel C. Agnew, Carrie L. Smith, Grace Beatson, and Janet Chipman.

From the very beginning the Auxiliary filled an important part in the civic and social life of the community. Through the years it has carried on a well-rounded program of activities, many of them closely woven with the welfare of veterans. It has given generously to various causes. At Christmas time members visit the Veterans Hospital to bring gifts to cheer the sick and disabled. As the town has grown in size the Auxiliary has grown also until today it numbers more than 80 members.

The Auxiliary meets the third Friday of each month in the American Legion Building in Thompson avenue, a building which it has a large share in making possible some years ago.

Present officers of the Legion Auxiliary are Mrs. Mabel Michaels, president; Mrs. Lucy Sarason, vice president; Mrs. Ellen O'Connor, secretary; Mrs. Edith Hahn, treas-
