### DISABLED VETS INTERESTED IN FLOWERS

"Deb" Coyle of the J. A. Long Co., local florists, told us this week of an interesting activity which has been set up as a demonstration and experiment by the National Florists' Telegraph Delivery of which the local firm is a member. It seems that close by the national headquarters of the association in Detroit, Mich., is a large government hospital for disabled veterans in Battle Creek. The florists' organization has been carrying on a project in the hospital to interest the disabled veterans in flowers, with the idea of making possible for them an outside interest which will not only aid their recovery, but which later may prove a profitable livelihood for some of them. The project has thus far proven quite successful.

Some of the veterans have found new interest and enthusiasm

in the making of bouquets and floral pieces. Already many of them have proven adept in the preparing of very beautiful decorative pieces. Work such as this can be done by persons obliged to work only while sitting or lying down. If they have the use of their hands they can with some instruction, provided they show artistic inclinations, be tought to fashion the beautiful floral decorations which are in such large demand everywhere.

Mr. Coyle cited one case where a youth, suffering from a severed

spinal cord, and who had lost all interest in living, was inducted to attend one of the classes. From that day on his interest in life was renewed, and his handiwork with flowers is one of the bright spots now in that hospital of war cripples. Work with flowers brought new hope and courage to this young man and to many others.

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


