He was the kind of fellow everybody liked. There was warmth and cordiality, and graciousness in his manner. That was the way it was at High school where he graduated last June and where, through his high school years, he was a most popular member of his class. That

He was a little fellow, scarcely 14 years old, when at the time of Pearl Harbor, the older boys marched off to war. He was taller but not much older, only 18, when, like the rest of us, he heard gladly, and with rejoicing, the welcome news of peace on V-J Day. But though the war had ended there was still need for youths like Ken. though the war had ended, there was still need for youths like Kenneth to answer to the eall of their country. He answered that call last Christmas, not to war, but to the peace-time service of the nation. Last week illness, a sudden attack of pucumonia in a deadly

form, overtook him at Keesler Field in far away Mississippi, where he was undergoing the rigid training of a private in the peace-time army. His death has given us our first Gold Star of Peace-time. Kenneth was a lad of great promise, He was the sort of youth this town, or any town, could ill afford to lose.



# How would you CHART YOUR COURSE?

Pictured here are the records of four "life lines" of our business—four things which largely control the destiny of any business, whether it be a farm, a factory or a store. They are Wages, Materials Costs, Prices, and Profits. Suppose these were pictures of what is going on in your own affairs. How would you chart your



What about wages? Wages have risen sleadily for five years. Before the strike which beyears. What about profits? Risk is part of the American profit and loss system, so we do not, of course, ask either our customers or the Government to guarantee that we can be certain of profits each year. The chart tells, the story of our profits during the war. Although Harvester produced more goods than eyer before, it had no desire to get rich out of war, so our rate of profit has steadily good low. What our 1946 profit will be is extremely uncertain.
