How would you CHART YOUR COURSE?

General cleaning work, painting, cottages and homes cleaned. Includes various charts and graphs showing trends in wages, materials, prices, and profits.

What about wages? Wages have risen steadily for five years. Before the strike which began on January 21 in favor of our plants and which has closed off all farm machinery production, earnings of employees of these plants... What about materials? No one seems to know how high materials costs will go. The Government has increased steel prices as much as \$12.00 a ton, with an average increase for all grades of 8.2%. Steel is the most important material we buy, but prices on other materials are also increasing.

What about prices? There has been no general increase in our prices since they were frozen by the Government in early 1942. Since then a few small increases in prices have been allowed where particularly essential. Our prices are substantially increased in design.

What about profits? It is a part of the American profit and loss system, so we do not, of course, ask either our customers or the Government to guarantee profits. The chart talks the other way. It shows that we are not making as much profit as we should. Unless it is settled we do not see how we can settle the wage question. Until the wage question is settled we do not see how we can resume production and begin turning out the farm machinery which we know our customers need. Because of the important role which both farmers and city dwellers have in this controversy, we are bringing it to your attention. Through the cross-country drive of today's conditions we are trying to chart a course that is fair to our employees, our farmers and our customers, and our stockholders.

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Stock Holders Elect Two Men

Mr. Allen has been with the power company since 1917. He began as Office Manager and became Auditor, Executive Assistant, Assistant Secretary and Assistant Treasurer. In 1929 he was made

Manager of the Company's Waterbury district, a position he held until 1939 when he was appointed to the newly created position of Director of Public Relations. Mr. Allen's Departmental responsibilities include Customers Relations, Advertising, Publicity, Employee Relations and welfare, Personnel and Claims for Injuries and Damage.

He is past president and past president and past District Governor of Rotary, Vice President of the Public Utility National Advertising Association, and a Director of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Waterbury. He is a member of the Waterbury Club and numerous Fraternal and Trade Organizations.

Mr. Amberg was born and educated in Switzerland and came to the United States shortly after his graduation from college. From 1908 to 1917, Mr. Amberg worked successively with the Baldwin Locomotive Works, did Designing and Surveying on a Susquehanna River

Dam and on Transmission lines for a Pennsylvania Power Company and had charge of all Electrification Designs and the reconstruction of the Stamford-New York lines for the New Haven Railroad. He came to the Connecticut Light & Power Company in 1917 as Electrical Engineer and was later promoted to head the company's research department. Mr. Amberg's responsibilities include Engineering Research and Design, the Statistical studies and capacity and load forecasting.

Mr. Amberg is a member of the Waterbury Club, University Club and the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

3. Chest x-ray surveys aid the control of chest disease. The discovery and treatment of persons who have these conditions make the community a safer place to live in. In the long run, this helps everyone to maintain better health.


