OUR MAIN STREET OFFICE

We hadn't been in our new office in the Professional Building at 239 Main street very long on May 1, when it came our first new subscriber. By an unusual coincidence, the first subscriber to sign up at our new office was Brewster Bush, recently returned from service, and who has recently opened an insurance business. We say coincidence because it was his mother, Mrs. H. C. Bush of Hemingway avenue who was our first subscriber when we mailed out our initial notices of publication in the fall of 1944. Mrs. Bush too, was the first to send in a renewal last year.

Our new office is centrally located, and although our time does not permit our being at it only occasionally, Mrs. Virginia Beebe, will be very much pleased to meet old and new subscribers who care to drop in with news items, or other matters concerning the East Haven News.

Because of delay in obtaining phone service, our office neighbor, Mr. Alfred Holcombe, who recently opened an insurance business in the same building, has kindly given us leave to have phone callers use his telephone for the present. We know it will be more convenient for our readers to use our Main street office. We hope especially that long items, particularly those having to do with weddings, or in which many names are given, will be provided for us in writing, so that mistakes, which frequently occur over the telephone, will be kept to a minimum.

A DUST BOWL FOR EAST HAVEN?

Some East Haveners have viewed with alarm the dumping of hundreds of truck loads of mud and muck, scooped from the bottom of New Haven Harbor, into Peat Meadow in the area to the north of the Route 1 cut-off, and are wondering if it will create a local "Dust Bowl."

This mud-dumping process has gone on now for the past month or so, since the dredging of the New Haven Harbor Channel got underway. Enormous scoops are scooping up the harbor bottom, the silt and mud being sent ashore at the old Canal Dock, near the New Haven Sewage Disposal plant at the foot of East street, and from there loaded into motor trucks, a continuous caravan of them conveying it to the Peat Meadow wastes, where it is being dumped as fill. The filling in of the Peat Meadow is progressing at surprising speed.

But many East Haveners are now wondering what will happen when this harbor bottom mud dries out. It is the same kind of fill that turned the once attractive East Shore meadows in the 32nd Ward, above Fort Hale, into a veritable "Dust Bowl", which, it will be recalled, has plagued residents of the Townsend avenue section ever since. Apparently nothing will grow in the dried-out harbor mud unless it has been covered over with top soil. Left in its original condition, the silt and mud dries out into very fine particles, which, when the wind blows, as it often does, forms dense clouds of dust to swirl across the countryside.

It is not a pleasant prospect, and it is to be hoped that the result of this dumping in Peat Meadow will not be a "Dust Bowl" to plague our town in the months to come.

WHY ADVERTISE?

Ten Dollar Prize For Biggest Pickerel

Graves Sport Shop And East Haven News Will Make Award For Record Catch At Saltonstall

The sun rose brightly over Lake Saltonstall Monday morning, a day neither too cold nor too warm for comfortable fishing, and found scores of fishermen, and a few women, waiting the opening of the lake for the 1946 fishing season.

It was the first time since before the war that the New Haven Water Company had permitted fishing at the lake, and as a result, well over a hundred were on hand to enjoy the sport, and they found the fish willing and eager to take the bait.

Here's the result of the first day's fishing as reported by State Fish and Game Warden Eugene Johnson: Number of fishermen checked, 125; Pickerel caught, 190; Calico bass, 29; Yellow Perch, 29; Blue Gills, 11; Biggest pickerel (it got away) 31 inches; Biggest pickerel taken home, 22 inches; Biggest Calico bass, 2 pounds;

Yes, it was a real red letter day for the fish fans. During the day the fish and game warden made his

way from one end of the lake to the other, on the Branford side, and that is a rather large journey, considering the kind of terrain covered and the fact that the Lake, measured from the Post Road to its northern Plover extremity is approximately five miles long.

The twelve boats, which have been stored at the boat house at the lower end of the lake during the war period, were all in use very early in the day and only a few were able to obtain them. The fisherman for the most part had to find vantage places along the shore, but no matter where they cast, they found the fish hungry.

Big Hospital Drive Opens This Month

The appointment of Mayor William C. Celentano of New Haven as honorary chairman of the public campaign of Grace-New Haven Community Hospital's \$5,000,000 building fund program was announced this week by Thomas I. S. Boak, fund chairman, who hailed his acceptance as "a heartening endorsement of the committee's progress and evidence of the widespread support we expect to find when the campaign opens late in May."

At a conference with J. Stephen Knight, the building fund's public campaign chairman, Mayor Celentano said: "As mayor of New Haven, I am deeply concerned at the present inadequacy of hospital accommodations in our community, and pledge my unqualified support of the plans to relieve the present congestion and to provide additional facilities which will help make New Haven an even greater medical center."

"Thoughtful citizens," he added, "will welcome the opportunity to take part in this movement to safeguard their life and health."

Stressing that the extension of hospital facilities in the New Haven area is urgently needed, Mr. Knight said that "the most striking evidence of the lack of accommodations is the present list of about 600 people who are awaiting admittance to Grace-New Haven Community Hospital."

"That fact is of utmost importance to every person who may have need to rely on the hospital for diagnosis, care and treatment," he concluded.
