A COLORFUL SPECTACLE

East Haven's community spirit had another lift last Friday night when the townspeople turned out, old and young, lining Main street in gay and happy mood to greet Pequot Tribe and visiting members of the Improved Order of Red Men. It was a parade and ceremonial to be remembered. In full regalia, led by Great Junior Sagamore Harry McLay, and other mounted "high-ups" of the patriotic order, and to the snappy tunes of the New Haven Y.D. Drum Corps, the Red Men marched down Main street from Red Men's Hall in the West End to the Green, which they circled, and thence back to the town hall, where more than a half hundred "pale-faces" were initated into the first mysteries of the organization. The parade was in early twllight, and the flares of red

torches added to the colorful spectacle.

The Red Men are to be commended for providing this memor able feature for Flag Day. It proved once more that East Haven people like to come together in neighborliness along Main street. More such affairs as this will do the old town much good.

The outpouring of local residents, flanked by a goodly number from the neighboring communities, must have impressed the visiting Red Men of the hospitality of East Haven. There was a creditable display of flags along the line of march and the crowd was good-natured and orderly even though the parade did not get underway until more than a half hour after the scheduled time.
