The town recently set a good example by laying a handsome new sidewalk in front of the Town Parking lot in Main street. It could go a step further now in directing that property owners proceed to lay sidewalks and repair those upon which repairs had ought to be made for safety

## STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE TIME

There's a taste to strawberries grown in these parts that we haven't been able to detect in those that are imported to our mark ets. We have sampled many of these ripe, red luscious berries from nearby farms at the various festivals which occur at this season, and upon our own table. We always welcome strawberry shortcake time. There are few dishes that can quite so well satisfy the palate and the eye as strawberry short cake, the kind that is turned out by the local housewives in strawb erry season. We can make a meal

Take it from us, there is delight in every bite, if the strawberry shortcake has been made right. And unless it is made right we want none of it. Take the restaurant variety, made to entice the unwarry, it is spongy, soggy, tasteless, a disappointment and an affront to the palate.

The proper ingredients must be put together in the proper proportion, and left in the oven just the right length of time to become golden brown outside and light inside. It must be prompt-

It must be prompt-ly withdrawn, split, buttered, (we insist on butter, shortage or no) and covered with mashed strawberries so that the juice can penetrate. There is nack too to preparing the berries. They should be newly picked of course, slightly mashed, sugared, and let stand, but not too long. Personally we don't care whether whipped cream is added

The enjoyment of strawberry shortcake is a three-dimensional one, the senses of taste, smell and sight merge delightfully as one sits down to the kind of st rawberry shortcake we enjoy in East Haven. Perhaps someday we will be able to deep-freeze our strawberry shortcakes and enjoy them all the year around. That will be one step toward Utopia.
