FORBES PLACE INTERSECTION

Fred Dichl brought up, recently, at a meeting of the Rotary club a suggestion, which we hope will get further consideration, that efforts be made to have the State Highway Commission and the State Traffic Commission provide safety measures and installations at the intersection of Forbes place and the Route 1 "Cut-Off."

He urged that a movement be started toward obtaining a traffic light for this intersection in safety that a solution is safety that a solution.

Forbes place has proven to be the chief entrance and exit of traffic to and from Route 1 in East Haven, yet thus far, in the five years the super-highway has been open, no effort has been made by the state authorities to treat this busy intersection any differently than if it were an ordinary one. If the Traffic Commission were to make a study of the intersection it would find that most of East Haven's car drivers, enroute to New Haven, use this intersection. It is necessary for them to cross the east-bound traffic lane against a double line of speeding cars, in order to enter the west bound lanes It is a dangerous situation that has already caused many accidents and will cause more until something is done to make entry into the "cut-off" safer.

Mr. Diehl suggests a traffic light. Others have suggested some sort of rotary arrangement which would reduce the speed of through cars and give local drivers a break. Whatever the remedy, we hope it may be found soon, now that motor travel has again reached a

I Saw God wash the World last night With His sweet shower on high; And then when morning came I saw Him hang it out to dry.


He washed each tiny blade of grass And every trembling tree; He flung his showers against the hills And swept the billowy sea.

Forbes place has proven to be the chief entrance and exit of traffic to and from Route 1 in East Haven, yet thus far, in the five years the super-highway has been open, no effort has been made by the state authorities to treat this busy intersection any differently than if it were an ordinary one. If the Traffic Commission were to make a study of the intersection it would find that most of East Haven's ear drivers, enroute to New Haven, use this intersection. It is necessary for them to cross the east-bound traffic lane against a double line of speeding cars, in order to enter the west bound lanes. It is a dangerous situation that has already caused many accidents and will cause more until something is done to make entry into the

Mr. Diehl suggests a traffic light. Others have suggested some sort of rotary arrangement which would reduce the speed of through cars and give local drivers a break. Whatever the remedy, we hope it may be found soon, now that motor travel has again reached a

He washed each tiny blade of grass And every trembling tree; He flung his showers against the hills And swept the billowy sea.




