### TEACHERS AND CIVIC PARTICIPATION

At the recent town meeting quite a bit of surprise was expressed over the presence of so many teachers. There were even some, we fear, who were rather angry because of their attendance.

This incident is only one indication of an awakening, throughout the country, of a group which has been too often afraid to take their rightful place as citizens through fear of retaliation on the part of some who might be displeased at the way they vote on local issues.

Very few subjects are required by law but our statutes devote considerable time to the subject of Citizenship. Teachers are required to give instruction in government including local divisions. In the past they have hesitated to mention in class certain phases of local or national government because of the violent criticism of some who have misconstrued their statements.

It is time that teachers were granted the rights enjoyed by other citizens without having to be fearful. Let's hope that they learn to teach citizenship by acting as citizens—not only when it affects them directly, but at all times.

We were glad to see the teachers at the Town Meeting and hope they will be regular attendants in this larger school room of our local civic life.

### WHY MATERIAL IS LEFT OUT

We regret that two or three important news pieces had to be left out of the NEWS last week. We would have liked to have carried them in full and know that our readers would have found them interesting.

The reason for their omission, however, was the simple fact that they came to the hands of the editor on Wednesday. As practically all of our material has already been "set" on the linotype by mid-week it is a physical impossibility to take on additional copy at the last minute. Although the NEWS does not reach its subscribers until Friday the paper goes to press Thursday. That means that all "copy" except short last minute "musts", has to be in early in the week. There is no reason why material which is not "spot" news cannot be in our hands by Monday or Tuesday, preferably even early, say the week end prior to our publication day.

A community weekly has no large battery of linotypes. Each day a certain amount of "copy" can be "set" and this is limited by physical and mechanical reasons. As a matter of fact preparation for the paper is begun the Friday and Saturday prior to publication and it is the Editor's task to "budget" his material so it can reach the printer a few "takes" at a time. This means that material sent us three or four days or a week ahead can be taken care of while "copy" arriving as late as Wednesday must take its chances.

We find that most of our contributors are cooperating by mailing their material early and that, believe us, takes a real load off our shoulders and is very much appreciated.

### CROSS-TOWN BUS SERVICE NEEDED

Again we raise our voice in favor of cross-town bus service for East Haven. Now that the war is over and new motor busses are being added to the equipment of the Connecticut company it would seem to be time to renew agitation begun some time ago for public transportation service which would make travel possible between our outlying communities and the center.

We were reminded this week that a petition was signed by some 200 or more residents of the Dodge avenue and lower Thompson avenue section during the war asking that the Airport Bus line which now ends at the Airport at Morris Cove be extended through Dodge avenue to the proposed Athletic Field at Thompson and Dodge avenues. We believe that such a bus service extension is necessary and that it should extend further to and beyond the Town Green to become a part of the Saltontall Bus line.

Another petition was raised sometime ago for a bus line which would reach down Laurel street from the end of the present line at the Golf Course. This extension would facilitate the residents of a growing area to reach the center. Still another petition as we recall it asked for bus service to Coo Haven and such a service would include Short Beach road from Short Beach to the Center. There is also need for service from Foxon Park and Foxon down High street to the center.

The Business association has a committee at work surveying cross-town bus needs. We believe the time has come to expedite the bringing of public transportation to the parts of the town that have need of it.

All over this league Sperry was considered one of the best major league prospects. He tied for the lead in hitting with a mark of 352 and his slugging was sensational. Bob was a tie in runs batted in with 80, second in the number of doubles with 24, most triples with 14, and second in home run hitting with 11. He also did well in the stolen base department pilfering 16. Young Sperry is owned by the Boston Red Sox and next spring will see him at Louisville of the American Association.

## Chidseys Celebrate Golden Wedding

Mr. and Mrs. Samuel R. Chidsey Were Wed In Stone Church On Oct. 21, 1896

The Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Russell Chidsey of 44 Taylor avenue was celebrated on Monday. The well-known couple received the well-wishes of their very large circle of friends.

Mr. and Mrs. Chidsey were married by the late Rev. Daniel J. Clark who was pastor and pastor emeritus for more than a half century at the Stone church. The wedding took place on Wednesday at 8 P. M. on Oct. 21, 1896.

Mrs. Chidsey is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald Macdonald of South End. She was born in New Haven but resided in East Haven from early childhood. Mr. Chidsey, son of the late Capt. and Mrs. Samuel Chidsey was born in East Haven and has been a lifelong resident of the town. Mrs. Chidsey's

parents came from Rosshire, Scotland in the late 1880's. Mr. Chidsey's ancestral line extends back six generations to Deacon John Chedsey who came to this country in 1644 to settle in East Haven on the north side of the Green.

Mr. Chidsey was born in the old colonial dwelling that stood opposite the Stone church. The house was torn down to make room for the East Haven Bank Building. Mr. and Mrs. Chidsey made their home at this location, Main and High streets until its sale to Martin Olson in 1928.

Mr. Chidsey became associated with the Security Insurance Company of New Haven in February 1891 and was steadily employed by that firm until the time of his retirement in January, 1933. He established a local fire insurance agency at East Haven in 1896 and in 1909 formed an insurance agency partnership with Wallace S. Coker. It was during this present year their agency celebrated its 50th anniversary.

## Chief Hanson Urges Caution In Use Of Fire

Calling attention to the fact that the autumn season of grass and woodland fires is with us, Chief Ernest Hanson of the Fire Department this week urged that caution be taken in the use of fire out of doors. He recalled that East Haven was the scene of some particularly costly woodland fires last season.

He quoted State Forester Klenholz and state Forest Fire Technician McCarthy as saying that most woodland fires start from burning debris, clean-up activities and careless smoking.

It is unsafe, as well as illegal, Chief Hanson said, to start a fire without first clearing a space around it; that fire permit must be obtained from a fire warden, except during December, January and February; that it is illegal to allow a fire to escape to land of another person and that the person starting an escaping fire is liable for damage done by it.

The penalty for burning rubbish and kindling a fire without a permit in the restricted areas is a fine of not more than \$200 and not more than six months imprisonment, or both.

### School Dental Work Told To Rotarians

Dr. Morton J. Loeb, D. D. S., a member of the New Haven Rotary club and a leading member of the dental profession in New Haven, was the guest speaker at the luncheon meeting of the Rotary club last Thursday at the auditorium of St. Vincent de Paul's church in Taylor avenue. Preceding the talk the ladies of the church served a luncheon consisting of meat loaf, mashed potatoes, mashed turnips, asparagus, apple pie and coffee.

The speaker had for his subject, "Dentistry in New Haven Schools." He has long been interested in furthering the work of dental health among school children, and his talk was especially timely in view of the project now being discussed by the local club of purchasing dental equipment for the setting up of dental work in the East Haven public schools.

Dr. Loeb explained the program which has been set up in New Haven. He said that a large number of children have in the past been obliged to forego necessary dental care because of the cost involved. He said the only solution is through some kind of governmental aid. He said that this is government aid in many medical fields today and that this is being spread to include dentistry. Many cases of ill health in children can be traced directly to poor dental conditions. He said that the 70,000 dentists in the country are unable to give the full dental care to the entire population.





title of Christ. Mrs. Eddy defines "Christ" in the "Glossary" of Science and Health (p. 583) as follows: "Christ, The divine manifestation of God, which comes to the flesh to destroy incarnate error."

The destruction of the false concepts or illusions of the so-called carnal or mortal mind by the Christ power is true salvation.

The door through which the individual enters into the realization of his oneness with God is spiritual prayer. Mrs. Eddy writes in Science and Health (p. 12) that the prayers of Jesus "were deep and conscientious protests of Truth, . . . of man's unity with Truth and Love."

Healing, or demonstration, in Christian Science inevitably results from the acceptance of the spiritual facts of being in receptive individual consciousness. It is always a spiritual idea which heals and not a person.

About the middle of the nineteenth century, Mary Baker Eddy, the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, discovered anew the healing and regenerating power of God, as ever available to everyone who becomes willingly receptive to its impartial ministrations.

It is the general opinion of mankind that eternal life can only be achieved after the change called death. However, Christ Jesus, who knew more about life than anyone else, rejected that belief centuries ago. He said, "If thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments;" and again, "He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life" (Matthew 19:17 and John 5:24).

In these pronouncements on the subject of life, we find no authority for the necessity of an experience called death. Life eternal is a state of consciousness, for it consists in knowing God and His Christ aught.

## A LECTURE ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

Entitled: Christian Science: The Science of Eternal Life by Harold Molter, C.S.B. of Chicago, Illinois. Member of the Board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

The lecturer spoke in part substantially as follows:

In her book "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, Mary Baker Eddy, has given to mankind, in one short sentence of only thirteen words, the most complete definition of God which the world has ever known. It reads as follows: "God is incorporeal, divine, supreme, infinite Mind, Spirit, Soul, Principle, Life, Truth, Love" (p. 485).

Since God is the one and only creator, and since the Bible testimony indicates that He is Spirit, therefore all creation must be spiritual and can have in it no element of matter. The material universe, therefore, is but the false testimony of the so-called carnal or mortal mind, and its objects are the reverse of spiritual ideas. They are illusions or false concepts.

Christ Jesus, more than anyone else, refuted and rejected the evidence of the material senses, and placed this false evidence with the testimony of Spirit. Jesus was a human man, divinely inspired. He was constantly showing fourth, in height and deed, the very nature and qualities of God, thus presenting to human view, the true idea of God. This gave him the right to the
