GOOD RADIO LISTENING

East Haven is well within very good reception range of Radio Station WKNB, New Britain, which, under the management of Bob Martineau, has become one of the leading day-light broadcasting units in Connecticut. We have enjoyed listening to WKNB, which goes on the air at 6 A.M. with its program "Wake Up Connecticut" and signs off with a "Twilight Serenade" at 6:15 P.M. It provides news every hour on the hour, weather report every hour on the half hour, and news, features and special programs, mostly of Connecticut interest, the entire day.

We are interested to learn that a regular WKNB listener down in New Brunswick, New Jersey, was the prize winner in a nation-wide contest sponsored by the National Association of Broadcasters. Mrs. Sara Ellen Bullock, the prize-winner, has never visited Connecticut, but her husband is a New Englander by birth, and they enjoy the programs from Connecticut. Her prize-winning letter to Manager Martineau is as follows:

"Radio has brought the world to my doorstep. I am thrilled when I hear the voices of men and women who are destined to go down in recorded history; a privilege denied people of other ages. My children are receiving a colorful education which is a wonderful supplement to their textbooks. Their wide knowledge of world affairs is reflected in their large vocabulary. Strict censorship affords us clean entertainment for our children. More than anything else, radio has brought people together, and promoted understanding. People of every nationality, every tongue, every religion, every color, can express themselves over the air. Radio knows no racial or color barrier. It is talent and ideas that count. People from far off isolated places and those in crowded communities can clasp hands across the ocean, across the world. The humble, the talented, the renowned figure, can come into my living room and speak to me."

ON DINING OUT

One of our pleasures in which we are happy to participate from time to time, as many of our friends no doubt know, is that of "dining out". We like to set out after church of a bright Sunday afternoon for a motor drive through the scenic countryside and drop in at one of the many good eating places for a country or shore dinner. This was a pleasure we had to forego in war-time and in the days of food scarcity that followed, but now it would seem that the good old days of "dining out" are here again.

We have found many of our former stopping-off-places serving even better meals than ever and from time to time we learn of some new "dining out" discovery not too far away to reach comfortably.

For those who also like to dine out we take pleasure in mentioning a few where we know a fine dinner will be enjoyed at a price not too burdensome to the pocketbook. Nearby there is Art's Cottage Restaurant down on the South End Road at Morris Cove where we have never yet failed to obtain a good meal. Art's reopened the first of the month. On Main street in Branford there is the Mariner which is also widely known for its excellent home-cooking. A little further off are the Oasis and the Chello House both on the Post road, out Guilford way, and the Weather Vane on the College Highway below Cheshire. Still further out are the Pot Latch on the Wilbur Cross Parkway in Berlin and the Old Hundred in Southbury.

Later in the season when we travel further afield we hope to discover some new adventures in "dining out" and if any of our readers have any "finds" they would like to suggest we would be glad to hear about them.

EARLY BIRDS GET THE SPACE

Scarcely a week goes by that we do not find that certain important news items have to be left out of our columns simply because they did not reach our post office box or our editorial sanctum early enough. This is unfortunate and often we find it hard to explain why some items of less importance get into print while others are left over.

We have said before and we say again that getting out a weekly paper is not like writing for a daily. The daily newspaper has scores of pages and batteries of linotypes. They do all their news collecting and publishing in a single day for a given issue. The weekly on the other hand has limited space and limited typesetting facilities. By far the larger part of the writing has to be done before Tuesday of the day of publication. As a matter of fact about 80 percent of the "copy" we use the following Thursday has to be prepared the previous week end. Sometimes we wish we could use an extra page or two but it just isn't practical in these days of paper shortages, nor would it be possible in the mechanical department to undertake setting up and printing enough material at the last minute.

There seems to be little we can do about it except to urge all to send in their items early in the week, and even late in the week before publication, if possible, to insure publication. In this way the early birds will get the space and the late comers will have to continue to be disappointed, sometimes.

A special town meeting was held in the Town Hall at which Frank Hartman president. It was voted after much discussion to abide by the decision of the Board of Finance in heaving \$33,000 from the sum voted previously at a town meeting for additions to the school system. Bonds were to be issued and sold to provide money for a two room school in the Momaugundistrict, two additional rooms at Highland school in Foxon Park, and four additional rooms at the Gerrish avenue school. It was the opinion that this would provide for the school needs of the town for many years to come.

In Training Program

MAIN WEAPON AT ARMORY IS 105mm HOWITZER SELF-PROPELLED, AND SMALL ARMS—INTERESTED MEN INVITED TO SEE DRILL ANY THURSDAY EVENING.

Now that the Selective Service Act has been discontinued, all young men and veterans alike must continue to be prepared against all problems, whether foreign or domestic. Such preparedness is the duty of all as citizens of the United States. New training programs are now being introduced at Washington, but until these are passed and signed, voluntary enlistments in military organizations such as the National Guard are being sought.

At Branford, the Cannon Company of the 102nd Infantry Regiment is assigned for training and duty. The main weapon of this unit is the 105mm Howitzer Self-Propelled, mounted on a medium tank with full tracks. For small arms, the unit's equipment is the M1 rifle, carbine, .45 caliber pistol, 30 caliber and 50 caliber machine gun. Communications consists of ground

switchboard, field phones, and three types of radios. Instruments for fire control and other equipment make training an interesting function. There are also openings in various other fields, such as clerks, cooks, mechanics, etc. The unit also has various athletic equipment, an indoor rifle range, and sponsors interesting social functions for its members.

Another interest to all is the pay authorized by the Federal Government. For every drill period attended, members will be paid 1/30th of the regular Army monthly pay prescribed for each grade, plus longevity during the two week summer encampment which will be held at Camp Edwards, Mass., this year.

Anyone interested in joining the Branford Unit is cordially invited to attend the weekly drill periods held every Thursday evening at 8:00 P.M. at the Branford State Armory or any of the extra drill periods held Tuesdays as announced.

At present the age limit is 18 to 35 for initial enlistments, and up to 64 years of age for men having served in any of the Federal Services or in the National Guard since July 1933. Connecticut State Guard service is not accepted. Physical qualifications must be certified by physicians appointed by the Adjutant General's Office of the State of Connecticut.

Organizations are allowed two years to maintain the strength required by the War Department. This period is divided into eight stages of three months each. During each stage, the personnel is increased by a fixed percentage.

Stock Exchange Contemplated

Holders of the \$2.40 and \$2.20 preferred stock of The Connecticut Light and Power Company have been informed by mail that the Company plans later this month to propose exchange offers for their present preferred stock through a new issue of \$2.00 preferred stock, without par value.

The letter from C. L. Campbell, president of the Company, said that it is impossible to state at this time the exact basis on which the offers will be made but it is expected that it will be substantially as follows:

For each \$2.40 share exchanged—one share of new \$2.00 preferred stock together with an amount, not yet determined, in cash and a cash dividend adjustment.

For each \$2.20 share exchanged—one share of new \$2.00 preferred stock, plus a cash dividend adjustment.

The precise basis on which the preferred stock exchange will be offered will depend upon market conditions at the time it is made.

No tenders of presently outstanding \$2.40 or \$2.20 preferred stock for exchange are invited or will be accepted by the Company until the Registration Statement has become effective and the exchange offers made.

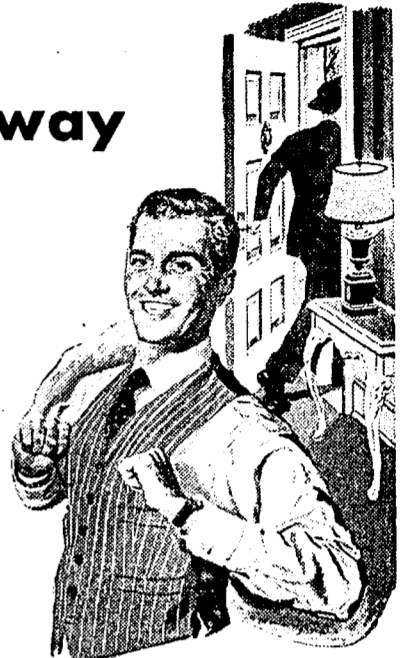

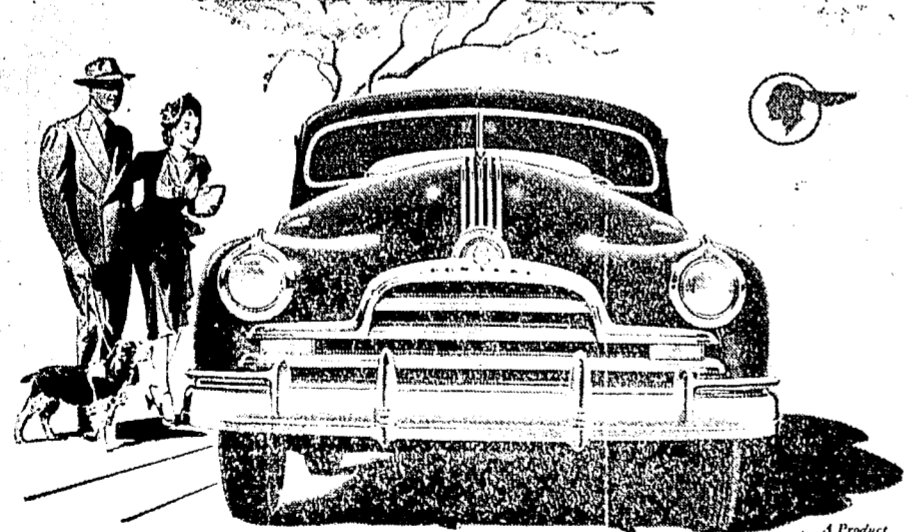

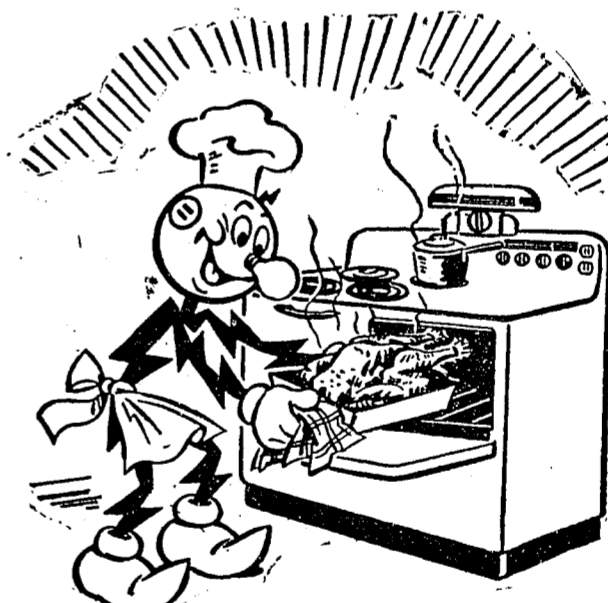
