A PUBLIC FORUM

At least five times since THE NEWS first appeared we have printed a paragraph which was, and is, a part of our general platform.

"THE EAST HAVEN NEWS hopes to have a part in our town's progress by serving as a medium for the exchange of ideas, for the promotion of projects beneficial to the town, for the creating of a spirit of cooperation and cohesion among all our people, and for the development of the common good. We will have no part in petty politics, in special privilege, or in that which will benefit any individual at the expense of the community."

We have adhered strictly to this statement and will continue to do so.

Recently communications and paid advertisements have come to THE NEWS that are of a political nature. We anticipate there will be more, because our columns would not be fulfilling their duty if they were not permitted to serve as a public forum for expression of opinion, political or otherwise.

However we must make these points clear: 1. Opinions, expressed by writers whose communications are published, are not necessarily those of this paper or its editors. 2. Our columns are open to all and to both sides of any issue or question. 3. Writers must be brief (in the future we must limit any communication to no more than a half column. 4. Communications must be signed, and the contents kept within the bounds their writers would expect others to do. THE NEWS can serve as a public forum only by adherence to these rules.

THE ANTIQUES SHOW

Milton Cottler served up last Wednesday through Saturday in the New Haven Arena what proved to be the best of the eight annual Antique Shows he has provided for the Antique "fans" of Connecticut. Collectors, and those who are "just interested" came from all parts of the state and beyond, to see the antiques displayed, and as we roamed up and down the interesting aisles Thursday night we noted many East Haven and vicinity neighbors among the enthralled spectators. It was a show well worth visiting.

We were interested in dropping in at the attractive booth of Nils Ahlberg, proprietor of the Old Mill Antique Shop, here in East Haven, where he and his brother, who has a similar business in New Haven shared the largest space in the big show. There were exhibitors from far and wide and hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of antiques of all kinds had been assembled under the huge Arena roof. If you had gone to the trouble of counting the number of booths you would have found seventy-three, and that is a lot for any show.

The greatest popular interest of any exhibit was that manifested in the Barber Shop of the Gay Nineties period. This barber shop was quite a contrast to the up-to-date tonsorial parlors of today.

There is something fascinating about an Antiques Show, and browsing through the many exhibits was an experience we enjoyed not a little bit.

CONNECTICUT VACATIONS

Our readers have seen that we like to quote from time to time from "Connecticut Progress", published monthly by the Connecticut Development Commission. This little four page publication has a lot of interesting and enlightening information pertaining to Connecticut and its industries. The April issue, which came to our desk, this week is devoted to the vacation business which annually brings millions of dollars to Connecticut people.

We were rather pained to notice in a map showing the towns in which vacationists stayed last year, East Haven attracted fewer vacationists than any of the twenty-three shore front towns. This does not, however, give the whole picture because most of East Haven's vacation trade is that provided by day-time visitors to our shore. Our summer cottages, too, are mostly occupied by their owners, and we have no large summertime rental or hotel business.

The bulletin informs us that an estimated 202,000 short-term vacationists come into Connecticut annually each summer and approximately 225,000 persons occupy summer dwellings. Of the 148 resorts, hotels, inns and camps listed, 56 are located along the shore of Long Island Sound and 92 are in inland locations. Private property in Connecticut which is used chiefly for recreation is valued at about \$100,000,000.

The money spent by summer visitors in Connecticut goes into every town in the state and aids retail business and city commerce as well as resort areas themselves. It is estimated that ten million dollars in new business will be brought into Connecticut this summer by vacation visitors who come to the state. Many of these visitors will be attracted to Connecticut by the advertising campaign being carried on by the State Development Commission.

LET'S TALK ABOUT YOUR CHILD

Dr. Joseph I. Linde, the Health Officer of the City of New Haven, who, before taking that important administrative post a decade ago, was one of the best known pediatricians in this part of the state, has asked us to extend a cordial invitation to East Haven and vicinity parents to attend a series of four meetings each Monday night in May. These meetings will be held in Trinity Parish House at Church and Wall streets, New Haven, starting at 8 P. M., and take it from us, who had a part in the planning, they should be about the best of this kind that have been offered anywhere, anytime.

The general theme is "Let's Talk About Your Child", and they will be run in the well known "town meeting" style.

The meeting May 5 will have to do with the Child's Health and the moderator will be Dr. Howard Colwell. Doctors Simon Doff, Robert Seinger, David Clement and Morris Krosnick will discuss various phases, including Communicable Diseases, Rheumatic fever, RH Factor, and Allergies.

On May 8 the moderator will be Dr. Linde, and the subject "The Child's Diet and Feeding." Discussants will include Doctors Edward Wakeman and Helen Richter, also Mrs. Francis Coles, nutritionist.

"The Child's Emerging Personality" is the title for May 19, with Dr. Grover Powers as moderator and Doctors Edith Jackson, William Curtis and Frances Eg the discussants. Miss Evelyn Eastman will also take part in the panel.

At the meeting May 26, Dr. Ira V. Hiscock will be chairman and the speaker, Dr. Arnold Gesell, will also show his famous March of Time movie, "Life With Baby", from the Yale Clinic of Child Development.

Needless to say, all of the speakers are leaders in their respective fields. We will be glad to see East Haven well represented by interested parents.

Aid On Cancer Available To All

Dr. Bove Receives Bulletin From State Department Of Health On Dread Disease.

The month just closed was "Cancer Month" when special efforts were put forth for public realization of the magnitude of the cancer problem. In East Haven as well as in other towns and cities throughout the nation the month was set aside for the raising of funds to carry on the medical warfare against the disease.

Of special importance at this time is a Bulletin received by Dr. Rocco Bove from the State Health Department which gives pertinent information as to the aid on cancer which is available to all. The article follows:

"The activities of all groups working on cancer are made public during April part of the effort to awaken interest and intelligent action on the part of individuals who may have or later develop this disease. Connecticut has an active cancer program. Every hospital, every physician and every individual in the state is eligible to share in this program.

"If an individual in Connecticut feels he has symptoms of cancer, he goes to his family physician

where he can receive a thorough physical examination. If laboratory procedures are required or if the physician is in doubt about the diagnosis, he may accompany his patient to one of the 23 state-aid cancer clinics in Connecticut and have the advantage of group opinion. If the patient cannot afford to pay for diagnostic procedures, the state may pay for them through special funds allotted for the purpose to the hospitals. If the patient has cancer, he is admitted to the hospital as rapidly as possible and treated. There is no delay because of lack of funds. He either pays for this himself or if he is medically indigent, cancer funds or welfare pays for it. Before discharge from the hospital he is informed that he should return for periodic checks to the hospital. If he is unable to carry on his usual duties, social service works with him to adapt his needs to the many agencies available to help him. No patient in Connecticut need go without care for cancer.

"Cancer month is a means of highlighting the works on cancer that goes on in Connecticut twelve months a year. Connecticut has a

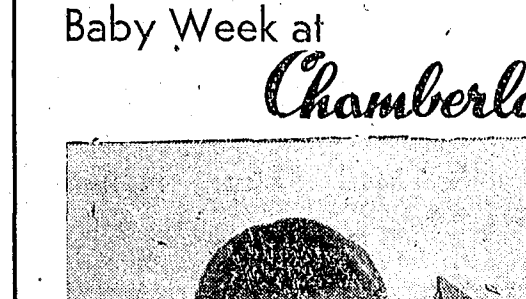
