"It is important to remember," Mr. Westerberg said, "that maximun rents remain just where they are under the old law. There is no provision in the new act that hanges rents automatically. A tenant pays the same rent in July that he did in June, unless there has been an order issued subsequently, or he has voluntarily entered into a lease with the landlord as required by the Housing and Rent Act of 1947.
