## Of The People ...

"Settled by a referendum vote" is a phrase voters have heard used frequently in the past and will be hearing a lot of in the next few weeks. The people of Milford made good use of the referendum by voting out the politicians and voting in the council-manager type of town government. There are those who suggest that the question of biennial elections which is to be considered at this evening's town meeting, should be settled by referendum vote, which is the referring of a egislative act to the decisions of the people Whether or not this will give an accurate reflection of the wishes of the people in Branford is questionable in view of past responses to issues re-ferred to the people for a vote. Last fall amendments put before the voters in the state by the Assembly were changed by a de-

cided minority of the eligible, registered voters. Only 73,000 of 957,646 registered voters voted on those amendments.

On October 6 Connecticut electors will be asked to vote on four more amendments passed by the 1947 General Assembly, Briefly these amendments are: (1) concerning the terms of the Judges of Probate; (2) providing for election of State othcials for a four-year term; (3) concerning for-feited rights of individuals; and (4) concerning the appointment of Judges of the minor courts. The primary purpose of most of these amendments is to allow legislators more time to concentrate m good government and less time worrying about

reelection. The privilege of voting is probably the biggest right we have under the constitution. It is our op-portunity to express our desire for or against a nan or an issue. That it is being overlooked or disregarded is proven by the figures quoted above -73,000 out of a possible 957,646 voters. Vote counters in our town's three districts found balot after ballot with the constitutional amendnent changes unchecked.

The problem of voting on these constitutional amendments is the same as if the question of biennial elections were to be settled by a referen endum vote by the people. All voters must avail themselves of the facts concerning the biennial election and then exercise their constitutional right by voting on the matter if it appears on the ballot. Questions concerning the town government are matters of vital concern to all of us. To leave it up to a few to decide the issues for all of us is to jeopardize the privileges we hold so

## Leadership

### Carries Responsibility ...

The Connecticut Forum of the Air was in these parts recently to debate a point dealing with our continued aid to Great Britain and what our (the US) stake was in the future of Britain. The Forum is a non-sponsored organization which uses 'n meeting type of program to debate points of interest to all. It attempts to provide men who represent all sides of a question, and it also gives the audience an opportunity to parti-eipate in questioning the platform speakers and in adding comments of its own to what the

The question recently debated was carried on speakers say. in fine fiashion except that the speakers tended a bit to get away from the subject they were discussing. The time taken for the Forum was wellspent, however, because many interesting theories were advanced. Probably the most interesting point raised during the evening was brought out in a discussion period after the regular broadcast period was ended. One member of the audience made the point that his experience in the service, and since that time, had shown him that the majority of the people—the average American, that is, who walks the street, who works in the shops and stores, and who served in the armed forces, -was not capable of making a decision on the im--was not capable of making a decision on the im-portant issues which confront our government today. Some of them, he said, didn't even know the name of the President of the United States. This, he concluded, was a deplorable fact, and would indicate that the average American (as described above) did not have the ability to assume positions of importance in government where he would have to make decisions for the rest of us. That member of the audience did not state whether or not he thought he (himself) was capable of assuming a position in government, but we as-

sume that he implied that he was. The basic, underlying contention of that man's statements is that all men are not created equal statements is that all men are not created equal and that some men are created with abilities which equip them to lead, while others are equipped to follow. This, of course, is a highly debatable point with many examples to prove that

it is true, and many to prove that it is not true. In nost cases, individuals will offer proof which con cides with their particular position in life-leading or following. For the sake of our argument we will assume that the contention is true :- that some are created to lead, and others to follow.
