HOUSE DIVIDED

We have reached page 749 of Ben Ames Williams' new novel, "House Divided" which in size, scope and color, we would say puts the famous "Gone With the Wind" to shame. Mr. Williams, whose "Strange Woman" and "Leave Her to Heaven" were read by millions and seen by other millions when translated to the movie screen, has in "House Divided" penned a novel which reaches the unbelievable extent of 1514 pages. We have been busy with our copy in spare time for two weeks and it looks like we will be living with the hardfighting, hard-loving Currain family for at least another couple of weeks. It is a Civil War story and Mr. Williams has handled his tremendous subject with such skill that no one picking up the book will want to miss a single one of the more than 1500 pages.

We predict that before long this will take No. 1 place on the Best Seller list. When it is made into a movie it would seem almost as if it would have to come in serial form.

We don't know how other will feel about it but we believe that the novelist has taken more than the privileged liberty in diggisg down 1 into the past of Abraham Lincoln and finding a fictional grandfather whose offspring, the Currains, were southern blood-cousins of the Great Emancipator. The world awaited many years for the opening of the sealed Lincoln papers this year, some waiting for scandal which did not materialize. Now a writer, whose work will reach millions of readers, creates a father for Nancy Hanks. It seems too bad because the book unquestinably will cause widespread discussion. But aside from this the novel is interesting extremely so. It would have been just as interesting had Nancy Hanks been left out altogether.

The record of the Republican Party for the past several years is an enviable one. Our financial position is excellent. During the entire ten year period your refuse and waste has been collected by the Town without additional cost to the Taxpayer and Coe Avenue was paved without the issuance of bonds.

Prevention

Calling on the nation to join in a concerted effort'to prevent fires, President Truman has proclaimed the week beginning October 5 as Fire Prevention Week.

Each year when Fire Prevention Week rolls around there comes the urge to issue a thanksgiving proclamation; an impelling drive to offer thanks for the blessing of freedom from the wastful ravages of fire and thanks to the volunteer fire department, all unpaid, who respond instantly when summoned to a fire.

Firemen are expected to impede and obviate the spread of flames, once begun, but are not answerable for prevention.

In his proclamation the President said, "I earnestly request every citizen to eliminate all possible causes for distructive fire in his home

and place of business." Local authorities cannot provide an array of skilled experts to inspect every home, building, very possible source of fire, correct dangers, or enforce corrections.

Prevention is the problem and responsibility of individuals.

If anyone doubts that fire losses have assumed the stature of an emergency, he need but look to the statistics for the first six months of 1947. Fire losses in the United States reached the staggering total of \$369,276,000-and that does not include

the major portion of the Texas City disaster. Loss of life has shown a similar increase. In most homes a very small expenditures of






