East Haven is joining in this national observance and well we should because of the important place the school holds in the American way of life today. Only recently have the members of our public school faculties, and this is true in most communi ties, begun to be recognized as the important professional people they are and paid anywhere near what is comensurate with what they contribute to the commonwealth. We are glad that recognition has been given them. We feel too, as do the teachers, that parents and the citi zens as a whole should take more interest in the schools than has been the experience in the past.

The slogan this year is-"The Schools Are Yours, Visit Them. In every community "open house" is being held during the week. East Haven's special "open house" has been set for this Thursday evening from 7 to 8 o'clock. Publicity to the "open house" has been given in the daily papers and we hope that the response is general. With schools taking the larger part of the taxpayers dollar the citizens should properly visit them and learn what is going on. The teachers feel that interested citizens and informed tuxpayers will pro-

It is fortunate that most of the Parent-Teacher groups have their regular meetings on the night set for the 'open house.' This should in encourage attendance. At the High school the Parent's night will be made the Monday with a program from 7:30 to 8 after which the parents will have an opportunity to visit the class rooms.
