It is good to walk in the East Haven woods in October when the trees are flaunting their autumnal glory. It is good, too, in a different way, to go some weeks later when most of the brightest leaves have fallen and those still on the bough are fading to dull red, bronze, russet. A cloudless day, with no wind or only a little breeze blowing, is best for a woodland walk up Foxon way in November. 




