In East Hampton the Horan company reassessment, according to the East Hampton News produced a grand list of more than ten and a half million dollars as against the old grand list of four and a half million dollars. In a majority of cases it seems property values were jacked up considerably more than twice the amount of the former assessments.

Compared with what has happened in East Hampton, East Haven has not suffered so badly. The East Hampton News takes the view that the reassessment

there is just about what the town wanted when it voted to spend \$13,000 two years ago for that purpose. Most of the complaints, the East Hampton News opines are coming from property owners, who don't understand that their taxes-the amount of cash they must part with---may be no more than they were last year, except for the increase in the costs of operating the town.

Reassessments on inflated 1947 values which result in lower tax rates may be alright but it is our opinion here in East Haven that such values plus low tax rates lend themselves to easily to further high governmental expenditures for local purposes as the time goes on. Personally we would like to see a tax rate high enough so that the public will be concerned about it, not a tax rate that is low because it is based upon assessments far in access of true property values.
