Bicycling is great fun, but there are times when it can become dangerous. To that end the local committee, headed by Herman Anderson, will endeavor to culist all East Haven bike riders into the ranks of safe cyclists.

Here are some of the rules that will be laid down for the local bievele riders:

Learn to drive a bicycle well before you ever go into the roadway. Good bicycle drivers do not wobble.

Ride in a straight line; don't suddenly change your course; don't zigzag or do "trick riding." Bicycles are designed for one person. Do not carry anyone else.

Keep both hands on the handlebars.

Ride under your own power. Do not hitch on, Keep well back from the moving vehicle ahead of you. It may stop very suddenly.

Cross all street car and railroad tracks at nearly right angles. Ride in single file on busy streets and never more than two

abreast on any street. Avoid driving too fast on hills and slippery or rough roads. Do

not race on public highways.

Yield the right of way to pedestrians. Keep close to the right side of the roadway. If necessary to turn out to pass a parked car, always signal in advance and be very sure you can get by without danger.

Keep bicycle in good operating condition. Be sure your bicycle has a suitable bell or other signal device; an effective brake, and for night driving, properly operating headlight, and taillight or good reflector. (Light clothing is desirable.)
