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Turbogenerators Go Into Service

C. L. Campbell, president of The Connecticut Light and Power Company, announced today that the first of two 31,250 kilowatt turbogenerators replacing two 10,000 kw units at the Company's Montville plant, was put in operation yesterday.

Work for construction of the generators was begun in the fall of 1946 and the project was rushed to completion to assist the Company in meeting tremendously increased demands for electric power. Capable of supplying one-half the electrical requirements of the Company's territory east of the Connecticut River, the replacement unit operates at a steam pressure of 850 pounds per square inch and at a temperature of 950 degrees Fahrenheit. About 300,000 pounds of steam per hour are required to drive the generator from its boiler which consumes approximately 13 1/2 tons of pulverized coal hourly.

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SPORTS IN REVIEW

The day of Branford sports is passing. Interest financial or otherwise is rapidly dying. The fault lies not with the townspeople who will support its teams if convinced that the teams will assist themselves.

When teams are apathetic and their ball playing poor then the cause lies with the players themselves. For some years we have been watching Branford baseball trying to grasp itself by its bootstraps and lift it to the level of the 1925 teams.

Those nines were built on practice. As they deteriorated each succeeding player believed that he was as good as his predecessor. But each succeeding player did not spend the hours in practice that he should have. In a decade Branford was out of the Middlesex league which because of its great record, it should have had life membership.

The politics of the league, while bearing the brunt of the blame, did not cause Branford to drop from the loop one half as much as the refusal of the players to practice to make themselves worthy to play in such competition.

We believe that Branford stands on the threshold of losing its grip in the East Shore league. That in itself is not a calamity. The circuit does not play fast enough ball for a town of this size to compete in yet our teams seldom copped the bunting.

Some of our younger teams are being coached by lads who should be still playing. The coaches themselves should still be learning the inside of the game.

The writer with all his years of writing, scoring and watching does not presume to know all about the grand old sport. He does not expect that he is capable of placing his finger on the blame but he does know that nothing was ever gained without practice.

The great musician is the practiced musician. The best skater is the practiced skater. The finest orator is the practiced orator. Where then does any individual presume that he can get off of the ground and step into a ball game and pitch the perfect game or squeeze in the winning run?

Out in Michigan State University one of the greatest basketball players to come out of this state has finished his first season on the court squad. With all his ability to play terrific ball against the best hoop teams in the state three years ago, he learned that his left hand was not as efficient as it should be.

He spends hours and hours after regular practice using his left hand. He did not presume that he was Branford's best. He practiced to make himself the best.

Whether there is to be a baseball team in town is not of moment. The big situation is—lets make it the best possible. If the older players do not want to practice then lets watch the younger ones do it.

College scholarships are won on athletic ability. Athletic ability is won by practice. Lets help someone go to school.

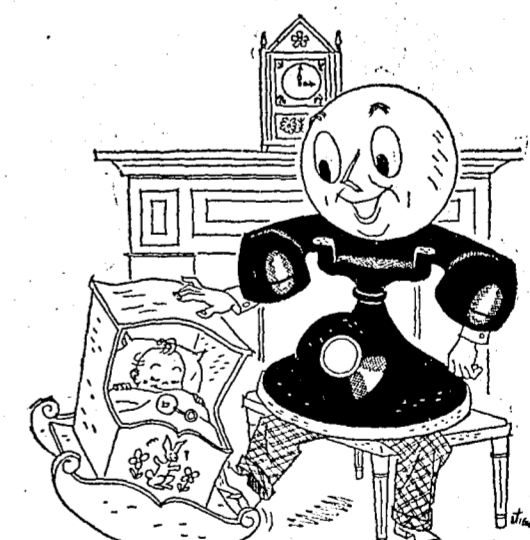
