HOW OUR HIGH SCHOOL STANDS

We have received a communication from one of our readers which gives a very clear picture of how our East Haven High School rates among other similar institutions of Connecticut. It puts to rest many of the rumors that have been heard around town from time to time. The letter is written by a person who knows our local school situation very well. We are glad to present it in our "Strictly Local" column this week, in the hope that it will be widely read. The communication follows:

"Editor Stevens:

"Recently someone asked me if there was truth to the rumors that our high school was unable to prepare students for college and that it had a low rating. My first reaction was to ignore the question because it is so ridiculous, but there are parents of pupils who are now attending the school or who will be in the future and some of these parents may have doubts as to the chances of success their children will have. Because of that, and with the hope of killing such rumors once and for all, I wish to give a few facts about the school.

"First, we might state that there are some parents who prefer private school instruction for their children because of religious reasons, because they want their children to be with the "right" people or because they feel that a private school has more to offer. A private school or a public school is not better than its staff and its plant. Most private schools cost from \$800 to \$1200 a year and have classes of ten or fifteen pupils. The public high school costs about \$145 per pupil per year and has classes which average about thirty. The private schools have teachers who are not required by law to have a teaching certificate but who are as good as the particular school can afford to hire. The public school teachers are required by certification laws to meet certain requirements and they also vary in different places according to the salary schedule. A private school in itself is not good or bad because it is private. The same might be said of the public school.

"Another difference exists between the private and the public school. A private school is primarily college preparatory and confines its activities almost entirely to preparing its students for some college. The public high school cannot choose its pupils. Everyone eligible on the basis of residence must be accepted. About ten per cent state a desire to go to college and must be prepared accordingly. The other ninety per cent choose other types of work and must be given the requisite courses. The school is by no means selective, nor is it college preparatory to the exclusion of other branches.

"Scores of communities are beset with rumors about their high schools. It is like an old, but false, legend. Only last year the Branford edition of this paper carried a well written story of the Branford High School and its standing. No doubt this was an answer to such rumors.

"The East Haven High School plant is one of the few complete and modern ones in Connecticut. Its staff is made up of qualified teachers with adequate training and experience. The rate of teacher turnover is so low that I doubt whether it is surpassed anywhere in the state. The school has every type of certification which is available to any high school. This includes approval by the State Department of Education and by the New England College Entrance Certification Board.

"Graduates of the East Haven High School have attended and are attending colleges ranging alphabetically from Albertus Magnus to Yale University. They have entered on scholarships and have been on Deans' lists. They have gone near and far and have made good. If a boy or a girl has sufficient mental ability he or she can get the proper amount of work on the studies prescribed by the school authorities.

"There are some who go to high school with the idea of going on to college but have insufficient ability or an unwillingness to work diligently. They should not attempt to enter college. If they are given a trial they often fail. Such cases seem to attract more attention among the neighbors than do those who go about their business making good in a quiet way.

"If you hear stories about the doubtful condition of your high school and if you do not have enough confidence in the school get in touch with those in charge and ask for specific information concerning those who are attending colleges and what kind of records they are making. For example, last year there were thirty Navy scholarships offered throughout the state. Three of the thirty were awarded to East Haven High School pupils. This is an excellent showing and is not the sign of a poorly managed school. We are a bit biased about our school and if you would like information from other sources we can refer you to Deputy Commissioner of Education Dr. Finis Engleman or Dr. P. Roy Brammell, Dean of the School of Education of the University of Connecticut. Both of these men are familiar with our schools and can give an official and unbiased opinion.

"The local school authorities recently asked the State Department of Education to conduct another evaluation of our high school to see what progress has been made since the evaluation which was taken five years ago. This will take place in May and the reports will be available toward the end of the school year. The findings will be made public. This will show our present standing and will contain recommendations for improvement.

"If you hear rumors concerning the poor standing of the school do your part to kill such stories and if you have children in the school you don't need to feel that they are being deprived of anything due them in terms of educational advantages."

Two East Haven Men Seeking P. O. Position

With the number of candidates from the New Haven Postal district for the position of superintendent of the East Haven Branch Post Office mounting, local interest centers in the two East Haven candidates, Linus J. Swanton and Anthony J. Caruso who have applied for the post to succeed the late Supt. John T. Murphy. Nearly a dozen candidates in all are seeking the position.

Both of the East Haven men have large circles of friends working in their behalf and letters are pouring in to Postmaster Patrick J. Goode urging appointment of one or the other.

Linus J. Swanton, who is clerk in charge here, has already been designated acting superintendent by the Postmaster. He has been a postal clerk since 1922 and connected with the East Haven branch office for 19 years. Mr. Swanton is a former commander of the Harry R. Bartlett post, American Legion, and has long been active in civic affairs.

Anthony J. Caruso is senior letter carrier here, has been in the postal service since 1917 and carrier in East Haven for a number of years. He, too, is a former commander of the Harry Bartlett post, American Legion, active in civic affairs, and during the last war was in charge of Civilian Defence activities for the town.

Other candidates as announced early in the week by Postmaster Goode who will make the appointment, are Charles L. Bouchert, Frank A. Coleman, Fred F. Dunn, James Connell, Salvatore Ambrose and Royal B. Wilson, all of the New Haven office. Since that time other candidates have been applying for the place.

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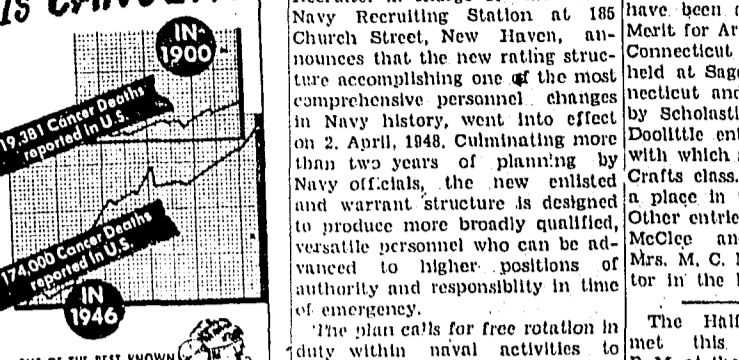

Timely Tips to Farmers:

Correct Nailing Vital To Long Roofing Life

Asphalt roofs, the type most widely used on farm buildings, will give longer service under the standard selection and application techniques recommended by the engineering committee of the Asphalt Roofing Industry Bureau.



When roof rafters are applied to a new deck, nails should be 1 1/2 inch long, he said, and when heavy applied shingle roof is being applied over an old wood shingle roof, nails should be heavy 1 3/4 and 2 inches. Heads should be at least 3/8 inch in diameter but 7/16 inch is better, he added.

Concealed Nails Desirable Other standard recommendations are that double coverage be applied with 16-inch shingles applied with concealed nails are preferred to exposed nails.

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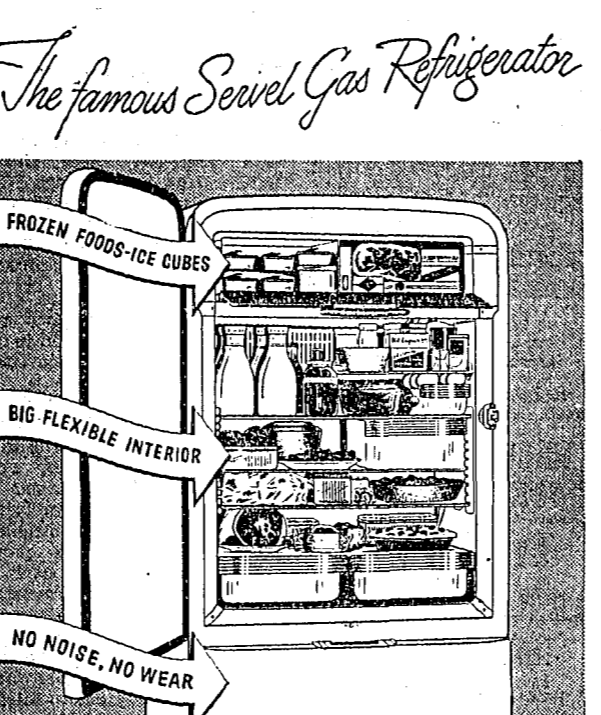
