

"If you hear stories about the doubtful condition of your high school and if you do not have enough confidence in the school get in touch with those in charge and ask for specific information concerning those who are attending colleges and what kind of records they are making. For example, last year there were thirty Navy scholarships offered throughout the state. Three of the thirty were awarded to East Haven High School pupils. This is an excellent showing and is not the sign of a poorly managed school. We are a bit biased about our school and if you would like information from other sources we can refer you to Deputy Commissioner of Education Dr. Finis Engleman or Dr. P. Roy Brammell, Dean of the School of Education of the University of Connecticut. Both of these men are familiar with our schools and can give an official and unbiased opinion.

"The local school authorities recently asked the State Depart ment of Education to conduct another evaluation of our high school to see what progress has been made since the evaluation which was taken five years ago. This will take place in May and the reports will be available toward the end of the school year. The findings will be made public. This will show our present standing and will contain recommendations for improvement.
