TUBERCULOSIS PROGRAM IN MAY

We are informed that East Haven's tuberculosis chest x-ray program will take place in May. Arrangements are now being made and East Haveners would do well to set down in their minds the dates upon which the chest x-raying will be done. These dates are Thursday, May 26; Friday, May 27; and Saturday, May 28.

Tuberculosis is one of the greater health problems which is being admirably met and the success in the reduction of the number of cases and deaths from this disease in recent years has been due in large part to the gifts which the people of East Haven, and thousands of other communities give during the annual Tuberculosis Christmas Seal Campaign each Christmas. A part of the money thus raised has been made possible the forthcoming chest x-ray program. As we have stated previously our Community has now been included in a committee taking in the city of New Haven and the surrounding towns of the Greater New Haven area. This is a splendid and inspiring example of inter-community cooperation.

The facilities of chest x-rays will be at no cost to any individual x-rayed. The campaign which will be very widely publicized when the time comes has the full cooperation of the East Haven Public Health Nursing Association which, as we all know, has taken a foremost part in every movement which has for its objective the betterment of the health of the people of this community.

Last year arrangements were made for the x-raying of East Haveners at the X-ray Department in New Haven. That was a step forward, but it was naturally limited in scope. But now, under the new set-up and with mobile equipment available, the full equipment will be brought to East Haven and set up here for three days, and the facilities open to all residents of the community and without cost to them. This is a real step forward for East Haven.

WE GO TO A ROAST PIG SUPPER

In our days we have attended many different kinds of luncheons, dinners and banquets. We have always enjoyed good cooking and are among those who believe that meal preparation and serving is one of the fine arts. Therefore we take pleasure in reporting a delectable roast which we were very happy to attend and enjoy one night last week.

War Hero to Be Buried With Military Rites

The body of Pfc. Frederick N. Burdette who lost his life fighting with the U.S. Armed Forces in the Pacific area during World War II, arrived in New Haven on Tuesday. Representatives of the city, veteran and patriotic organizations and auxiliaries were on hand to meet the body.

Private Burdette of the U.S. Marines was the son of Rose Kneuer Burdette, and the late Frederic C. Burdette, formerly of 330 Selden Street. He was killed in action on May 31, 1945, while serving with the 29th Regiment Sixth Marine Division.

He attended school in East Haven and was a member of the High School Senior Class of 1944. He died before his graduation, to receive his diploma in absentia. Besides his mother, he leaves a brother, Robert E. Burdette. He was assistant scout master of Troop 3, and an air raid warden before entering service.

A military funeral will be held Saturday with a solemn requiem mass celebrated in St. Vincent de Paul's Church at 9 A. M. Members of the American Legion will conduct a service in the Frank Belsler funeral parlors Friday at 4:45 p. m. in New Haven. Burial will be in East Lawn Cemetery.

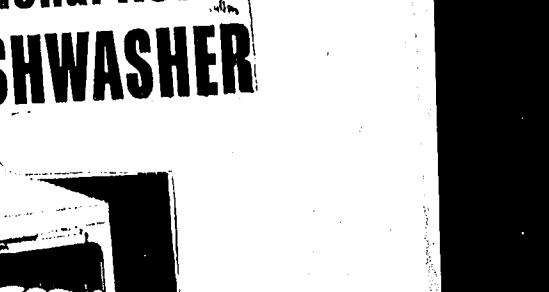

THE CLANSMEN

BY BILL AHERN

It took a long time this week to decide what person or event was to be recorded. One might easily have resorted to the old time Irish athlete, the bare handed catching days of W. S. "Bill" Clancy. Then, too, there were halcyon athletes like Mike Connelly, the Kellys, the Corcorans, the Reynolds family, the Carneys, the McCarthys, the Driscolls and many others, even to today's Hinchey, Murphys, Dolans.

But during the week long debate, a song kept strumming through the mind. It may be apt—for tonight marks the resumption of the St. Patrick's Night suppers of St. Mary's Church.

The song was the "Bold MacIntyres". It is a song peculiar to Branford parties for its catchy strains were often sung on the radio today.

But to the suppers. A double dose, or so, a strange happiness pervaded an Irish family on March 17th, for it was their joy. From the awakening of the family on that day, voices as they chirped the trill of the Irish Wash-crowman to unconscious sleepers, the day seemed fated.

Youngsters in school wear their hair or on their dresses or on a tie or a bow pinned to a coat. They went unheeded for they hands were filled with stories of St. Patrick and the boys wanted most to hear how he drove the snakes out of Ireland.

After school, baseball games were routine affairs as the lads marked time for the night's big event and long before dark the game was over and ears were being scoured and hair heavily slicked, by mothers desirous of keeping an unruly cowl in place.

By 6:30, the tryout was a hot bed of activity. Frank O'Neil had been busy for two days trying to coax a furnace, which only he understood, to the proper heat. For hours previous, the women of the parish had been slaving over baiky coal stoves attaining the right measure of perfection for the monstrous turkeys, the tangy apple pies.

Men gathered on the steps leading into the hall for the last bit of precious chatter and glorious drags on cigarettes at which pipe smoking or cigar puffing fathers would warn their offsprings, "Don't ever let me catch you smoking those coffin nails".

Some years remarkably pretty girls would wait on the tables. On other occasions the men would handle the trays. In nearly all of the later instances, some one was sure to get a lap full of vittles as heavy thumbs, used to carrying molder boxes, found delicate balancing an uneven match for clumsy fingers.

During the meals, above the chatter of voices, gruffaws of laughter would rent the air as natural comedians like Gene McGrath or Gene Bohn would give vent to some spontaneous witticisms.

First served, as at all suppers were those at the head table. The chairman of the committees, the good pastor, the Rev. Fr. Thomas J. Murray; the curate, the Rev. Fr. Edmund J. O'Demanski, as Fr. Murray would introduce him. Oftentimes the speakers were men prominent in the courts, Atty. Joseph Koletsky who invariably was tagged with an O' before his name. It might have been Atty. David J. McCoy, who needed no special baptism to bring his nationality to the fore. Oftentimes athletes were called upon to speak. They might have national reputations or merely local allure but always they were worthy of the accolades of those gathered to break bread.

Then it would be time for the entertainment. The program opened with those congregated singing, "It's a Great Day Tonight For The Irish". As the curtain rolled up, there would be perhaps twenty setting the pace. Sopranos, altos, tenors, baritones and basses, their singing defied competition. Most of them were trained, some were youngsters making their first appearance before an audience. There was no real attempt made to get any special persons to perform, everybody was expected to get into the act. Nor was the talent all strictly Irish.

John Borzillo, the father of Jackle, was nearly always on the scene. So was Jim Cosgrove who would sing, "The Low Backed Car" and "Where The Prairies Grow". Gertrude Clancy, now Mrs. James Walsh of Saybrook would appear. So, too, would Eugenia Kinney and Theresa McGrath, now Mrs. Frederick H. Bowns, the possessor of a lovely coloratura soprano voice. There was Margie McCarthy, now Mrs. Harold Griffiths, possessor of a strong and appealing soprano voice. Sometimes Frank Clancy, the undertaker, and his soft tenor, tunes would add his bit to the wealth of talent. And, of course, there was Bill Ahern, Sr., a real bass who would have to sing, above all others, "Off to Philadelphia in the Morning".

But that was not end. There were others who would sing. Young Gene McGrath would be prevailed upon to do his comedy numbers including, "My Irish Agriculture Girl" which was taught to him by Mary Devlin's, Ma. Before he finished he had to sing Harry Lauder's, "Oh It's Nice To Get Up In The Morning". Junie Cosgrove always appealed to the audience as he unabashedly sang numerous Irish melodies.

Jerry Collins would, on occasion lend his basso voice to the proceedings. His wife was an established hit each year. Katherine Daley lent ear and eye appeal to the program. Helena Odenkirchen was a big hit. In quartet but always they were well received.

The genuine waltz clog was the offering of the four Purcell sisters. Margaret, Ann, Mary and Helen. They will be more easily recognized today as the Mrs. John McGowan, John McDermott, William Greising, and teacher, Miss Helen Purcell. Sometimes they danced in pairs, sometimes in quartet but always they were well received.

Later other dancers, Charlotte Howd and Virginia Haglin, now Mrs. Milo Kibbe and Mrs. Howard Gebel added sparkling eyes and twinkling feet to the occasion.

When the Mooney family moved into town, Eileen, now Mrs. Richard Field, and Betty, became cause celebre among the diners for their bits of dancing mastery.

It was not all singing and dancing either for there was once a bit of election heard annually, it was called, "The Rope", and was a masterful bit of tongue twisting, probably an original piece—and it has not been heard in Branford since death sealed the loquacious lips of laughing Larry McGrath.

But by that time, the audience could be heard calling for the Bold MacIntyres.

And it was for that number that the curious collection of professional men and workers, fathers and sons, would devise many styles of the comedy.

Bill Ahern (Pop, that is) would do the verses. But before he would sing the number he had to have his own piano player. None of the church organists were called upon to provide the cherished bit of accompaniment, instead Mrs. Lawrence McGrath would be hustled out of the kitchen and, still wearing her apron, would provide her parlor piano playing to one of the East's great singers.

Then the number swung into the chorus. Streaming from the wings in a disorganized parade were the long, the short, the weak, the strong; the fat, the lean; the sombre, the robust; in the world's funniest cakewalk.

Three of the cleverest were Connie McDermott, Pat Dunn and Petey Sullivan.

All were clad in top hats. Some were battered. Others had not been out of the hat box since the last fourth degree of the K of C.

The story of the song told of the immigration of the MacIntyre Family to the United States and how they were welcomed by the various clans, the Kellys, the Rileys, the O'Shaunesseys, the Caseys and every McGuire.

It concluded, "Bow down to us low, (and the gang, some losing their hats or busting tight waistcoats, would bow) As marching we go, We're the elegant Bold MacIntyres."

Off again, on again Finnegan! It must have taken nearly an hour on some nights to get that number off the stage.

Then it was time again for the opening chorus. Sung a bit more fervently, it did well as the finale. 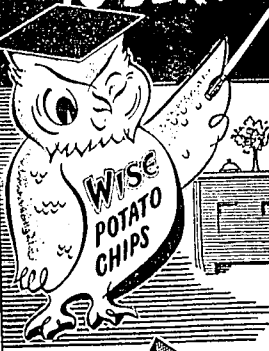
