The town of East Haven this week was actively engaged in obtaining new playground areas for the children of Foxon and Momauguin. The areas being set aside for the projects are on Austin Avenue in Momauguin, ntar Henry Street and

Tuberculosis is responsible for nearly 50,000 deaths in the United States each year. It kills at the rate of one person every eleven minutes —kills nearly 1,000 American a week.

I is true that tuberculosis has been forced from first to seventh place among leading causes of death in this country since the organization of the National Tuber.

among young adults between is and 34. One of the reason why tuberculosis has been difficult to control is that the disease is a highly communicable one, spread easily from person to person. To complicate matters, tuberculosis has no outward symptoms in its early stage. Therefore, a person may have tuberculosis in an early stage and not even know that he is ill. He innocently goes about his daily tasks, spreading tuberculosis germs among his family, his friends, and his working associates.

working associates.
There are an estimated 250,000 of these "unknown," or unreported eases of tuberculosis in this country. But we know how to find these un-known cases, and once they are found, measures can be taken to have them placed under treatment and thus halt the spread of their

nave them placed under treatment and thus halt the spread of their disease.

One way the unknown cases can be and are being found is by X-raying apparently healthy adults. For the Xray can "see" evidence of the disease even in its earliest stages, before symptoms are apparent.

In communities all over the nation, the National Tuberculosis Association and its 3,000 affiliates are cooperating with official health agencies in conducting chest X-ray surveys to find these unknown cases. Fortunately, the majority of cases found in the surveys are in the early stages, when the disease is easiest to cure.

The case, finding work of the tuberculosis associations is supported solely by the annual sale of Christmas Seals as are the other year-round projects of the associations which include health educa-


