





Though it won't be a problem for years, when the plant becomes unduly crowded so that bloom is adversely affected, division should be drastic. All old roots which are no longer of use should be cleaned out, the young roots as well as the follage reduced by half, then the plant reset in prepared ground. Plants so hand-led, even if only moved 5 feet will soon surpass plants divided and set with the entire root system un-touched. They apparently like be-ing challenged. Day-lilles need little care outside of careful weeding for the first year and as much as is needed for appearance's sake in following the part of the solution.
