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





One of the most practical remedies for traftic congestion in urban and suburban areas lies in the use of off-street parking facilities. These may range from the simplest of parking lots to multi-story garages. It is felt, however, that a discussion of certain types of open-air parking accommodations to fit the moderate-sized community such as Branford will best meet the needs of local planning.

Last week our discussion of "Curb Parking" indicated the usual need for additional parking space. A direct and simplified approach to the problem is here proposed in the discussion of open-lot parking facilities.

Location

Decrarance of the lot. Policing of paper and other rubbish is a "must" if the lot is to avoid becoming an eyesore. The use of landscape features, carefully designed, can aid much in making the lot a definite community asset.

Capacity of Lots

A determination of the capacity of the lot, is necessary if the land is to be efficiently utilized.

The five methods discussed below suggest the best means of utilizing an area for parking. As many lots are irregular in shape, sometimes it will be found that a combination of these methods will use the area to best advantage.

Parking Schemes

The first approach to the solution of parking difficulties calls for knowledge of areas which can be best utilized. Choice of location must be based in part upon the nearness of the destination of potential parkers. One must consider also whether vacant lots are to be used or whether it might be feasible to convert deteriorated areas into parking plazas. A careful survey of site should be the first step toward the creation of off-street parking facilities.


