Postmastor Warns On Yuletide Mail

In a typical Rumpus Room last Sunday night, a small, dapper, i graying, man was rocking back and forth on his feet, keeping time with recording being played on the radio-phonograph. His eyelids were lightly closed and his hand was tilted back, keenly observing the effect of the song on a small town, but critical, audience.

It was less than five years ago that the daughter of Eddle Kligerman stepped onto the same stage from which she scored so sensationally last night, Long honey-colored hair cascaded to her shoulders and the packed udlence was thrilled at the simple beauty of the girl who aspired to be singer. Her voice had timbre but her song selection was inadequate. Despite such a handicap, she was clear, and strong and sweet.

That fall she entered that New York incubator of top notch mush lans, Julliard, from whence she was soon writing home of the high notes she was hitting. That next summer, she made no local appearances and contented herself with lolling on the sands of Short Beach with other nvited friends from the same school.

But before another year was completed, the carefree moments of he summer were locked in memory's album and the girl was feverishly readying for a trip to London with the first road company of "Oklahoma."

Previous to making the trip she called hed dad from New York and told him of her chance and asked him for advice. His words were reassuring, "Honey, you go ahead and do just what you want to-and take care of yourself!" Already the businessman knew what her decision would be. She made the journey and the show was one of the greatest American hits ever produced on the London stage. It was likewise his-tory-making for members of the cast for they saw bombed-out London, a shambles of V-bomb destruction and were afforded many sightseeing aunts to the famous countryside and even made a trip to the British Parliment as the guests of Anthony Eden.
