FIRE MARSHALL HANSEN WARNS AGAINST YULE FIRE DANGERS

Newly Appointed Fire Official Cautions Public To Be Careful As Christmas Season Approaches—Spotlights Approved For Trees In School's, Churches, Halls, Etc.

Fire Marshal Ernest Hansen of the East Haven Fire Department this week warned local residents against the hazards of fire brought about by an improperly lighted Christmas tree or faulty decorations

by an improperly lighted Christmas tree or faulty decorations.

In his warning message Hansen pointed out that a small or medium size tree can be just as effective as an extra-large one and offers for less danger in case of fire.

Town fire regulations ban electric lights on trees in churches, schools, institutions and other places of public assembly. All decorations in these places must be of non-falamable nature. Trees must not be placed near exit areas, and smoking is prohibited.

Spotights highlighting a tree are permissible, Hansen said, providing they are placed some distance away. Switches for electric trains should be placed away from the tree since the rear representative of the

Suggestions Outlined

Suggestions outlined by Hansen include:

For the home, residents should select a small or medium size tree, in stead of an extra large tree. The smaller tree will be just as effective and less hazardous.

Place the tree in the coolest part of the room, away from heaters, registers or fireplaces.

Do not under any circumstances use candles, cotton or paper for iecorations on or around the tree. Check your light sets and wiring to see their edges, are, not frayed mid have the Underwriters Labora-ories testing approved label.

First Selectman Frank S. Clancy yestenday afternoon announced that the coming town meeting has been tentatively set for December 28.

Despite rumors, the meeting could not have been called previously, Clancy said, because the Board of Finance yesterday was still waiting for a description of the land which the School Building Committee intends to use for South School in order to incorporate it in the call of the meeting.

The Board of Finance will hold a special meeting on Monday evening, December 18, at 8 in the Town Hall and the call will be incorporated immediately thereafter.

Connecticut has a fine start in this field with its civil defense program. Each of us in coming weeks will be given further specific responsibilities as present plans unfold. In the meantime, here are some simple rules for guidance based on British and other experience in World War II and research since then.

The most important safety rule is to avoid panic or hysteria. Each of you should study these suggestions carefully so that you can act wisely in an emergency.

Connecticut Contributes
In 1943 the Vocational Agriculture and Home Economics building was constructed. The following year the Connecticut D.A.R. became interested in the efforts of the home economics department to improve the home of the students, and these patricitic women contributed funds for the establishment of Minor Practice Cottage where the home economics girls live and actually put into practice these things they learn in the classrooms.

In 1937 Marion Munson, an Indiana Daughter, contributed funds to build Munson cottage, the principal's home. The same year Daughters of the American Revolution in all 48 states contributed funds for the building of Becker Hall, the school gymnasium. Pennsylvania D.A.R. gave the Julie Heaume Teacherage. ilbrary and the Ohio Daughters the Julie Heaume Teacherage.

In 1938 Mrs. Minette G. Dick, of Maryland, gave funds to build the Health House. Here the registered nurse lives and holds her community clinics. The George and Frances Ball Foundation erected the Ball Teacherage, home of ten faculty members. In 1940 the Model Farm was purchased by the Alabama D.A.R. and Indiana Daughters built Schlosser Cottage, the home of the vocational agriculture teachers.



sodium fluoride is present normally
in some drinking water supplies,
but not in those in Connecticut.
Research studies have invariably
shown that lower tooth decay rates
are associated with natural
fluoride-bearing water than in

of Health believed that similar results could be obtained by adding
sodium fluoride artificially to water
supplies. To test this hypothesis
an experimental project for Connecticut was set up in April 1945.
The immediate objective was to
group and compare the findings
over a period of years with another group of children where
fluorides were not present in their
drinking water. The results were
so impressive that Connecticut now
has two state insultutions adding
fluordes to their drinking water.
This type of step just taken by New
