


POLITICS WITH DIGNITY

There is one source of consolation to the voters of the Town of Branford which developed this week and that is the apparent hope that the town's politics will return to the dignity befitting its birth.

While we neither praise nor condone the former First Selectman's action in resigning, we are mindful that he was sincere in his convictions. We are aware also that there are two sides to every story and that the obstructions placed before him were not altogether without design or purpose.

nsinuations oftentimes are more damaging than aattack. His objections to the actions of other Selectmen might have been more definite and the cloud under which the remaining men must operate will be a heavy burden.

The sincerity of the ex-official was genuine and his refusa to return most helpful in bringing a bit of light through darkened political skies.

The action of the six man Democratic committee bringing the black umbrella of appeasement to Collins was a sore point with the Democrats and was only brought about after a heated town committee meeting last Monday night.

The move was a wilful action, and politically smart lesigned to extend a palm leaf to Taxpayers and show that Democrats were ready to do everything within their power to retain an admittedly powerful vote getter although not a avid party worker

Party men, not frightened by possibilities but aware that each passing moment was bringing the Democrats into publidisfavor, accented their disbelief of appeasement with violer disapproval of the move.

They were men of substance and character, importan ndividuals, who believe in the democratic way of life an better government through progress not mere assertions brough the will of the people not thumbscrewing tactics (a coalition government which at best represented two trend of thought and not always wholesome ones.

Conscientious Democratic Government is only hopef thinking when placed in coalition hands even as the appease ment action was early Tuesday evening. It is absurd to believe that a handful of disgruntled Republicans could achieve such control of town affairs, or that Democrats long used to defeat revious to 1945, could prostitute their hopes and aims of faithful service and sound duty to state by being satisfied with a mite of influence, dished out in miserly amounts.

The big names of Democratic office holders have not uffered so greatly in the apparent split and even, if so, are willing to forego a possible election calamity in the beliefs of their office and plans.
