## Undemocratic Action Of Town's Citizens Is Breeding Trouble

The following letter was received this week by the Editor of the East Haven News from a resident of East Haven. It is particularly distressing to realize that such a condition exists in our town. It follows:

East Haven, a unit of the United States of America. Of recent date, I had a citizen and taxpayer in the Town of East Haven approach me with a problem that I thought was unbelievable in a community such as East Haven where I have found the doctrine of "live and let live" and where nationality, religious and political prejudices do not seem to hold forth.

This citizen presented me with a letter as well as other forms of correspondence that have been directed to him and his family through the mail that are comic in appearance, but certainly seek the suggestion of derogations against this individual and his family. His home is located in a residential section of East Haven where I have found people of high calibre reside. You have the information he gives me, it is difficult to even consider that such actions could occur in any section whether it be residential or otherwise.
