



PARKING-A MAJOR HEADACHE

Petela, who bluntly asked, "Will meters provide additional parking space? Will meters facilitate the flow of traffic? What about

that the gathering had an open mind. Parking might well have been an important matter to those present but they wer determined to hear the pros and cons before voting on its solu-

There was no solution offered and the vote was negative In all probability the business houses were tendered a boon without realizing it because without sufficient parking space it serves little purpose to tax shoppers for the privilege of doing

we are glad we opposed the meter system which, had it been allowed to go on trial, would have remained and the serious matter of providing alternative space would have been avoided,

The Review commends the work of the Chamber of Commerce in bringing the matter before the public. It salutes the effort of the police commissioner who warned that the commission as presently arranged does not have to abide by the decisions of previous bodies and then in ringing terms spoke

It remains however for the police department to press its thirty minute parking restriction not for an hour, not for a day, not for a week but indefinitely.

It is well that political chieftains speak on the subject and urge action for they, too) by the nature of being citizens and taxpayers, are concerned with a problem, which, unless it is solved soon, will find the town's business center moved elsewhere, probably to North Main Street after the new Route One expressway becomes a reality, a few years hence.

Con Increases

Landlords generally have sound grounds when applying for rent increases, records disclosed by Charence C. Westerberg, area rent director, showed yesterday, Westerberg said that in the last nine months his office has allowed 7,997 increases, approving 78 per cent of all the requests made.

At the same time Westerberg said that statistics compiled by him show that since 1941, when rent controls were first applied, the cost of cond and oft has doubled, while there have been increases in taxes and insurance. While insurance rates have changed little, property owners are carrying more insurance today than 10 years ago because of higher replacement costs when a stucture is damaged by fire and an upward trend in judgments in personal liability cases.

Westerberg said that the 7,007 increases granted between July 1, 1950 and March 15, 1951, totaled \$39,748, or \$4.96 per month. 


