Henceforth the center alarm will be sounded for all fires in order that those volunteers from other areas may know if their district is affected.

Thirty two blasts repeated twice will be the air raid alarm for the center only and in all other districts a continuous sounding of the siren or horn for three minutes will notify townspeople of forthcoming

The all clear signal for the center will consists of 25 blasts at two minute intervals, three times. Other areas will be notified of the all clear by the sounding of a siren or horn for one minute, three times, at two minute intervals.

The schools will be notified of no school at 7:30 A.M. with a horn of siren sounded four times. Foxon is excepted and the children of that area will be notified by a horn blowling four times, at 7 A.M.

Residents are warned again that to report a fire only Dial 4-2651 or 'Operator.' For all other purposes, the Fire Department should be notified by dialling, 4-2250.

Chief Hayes said that the box number will be operated three times for fires.

Legislative matters which require more study than the shiperson allows can be presented to the Legislative Council. This Council acts as a fact-finding service agency of the General Assembly. It accepts proposals from the Governor, from its own members and from members of the Assembly. The objective of the Council is to present factual information upon subjects referred to it and to suggest inprovements in legislative procedure which will benefit legislators in their work.

It is composed of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, minority and leaders of both Houses: four members of the Senate and eight members of the Senate and eight members of the Senate and eight members of the House, resulting in a membership of nine Republicans and nine Democrats.

Among the subjects considered by the last Legislative Procedures, designed to improve and simplify the work of the Assembly: The Minmun Age Requirement of Motor Vehicle Operators which necessitated that committee inquire into the policy followed in other states respecting the licensing of so-called teen-agers: The Attachment Law, the most apparent reason for needing to change this law, was the hardship resulting from its strict application in some. cases; The Municipal Employees Retirement Law, for in recent years there has been much agitation for broader home rule powers for municipalities, and, as this subject naturally embraces retirement systems the Council continued its study. 


