MEMORIAL DAY PARADE FEATURES VETERAN GROUPS

Civic organizations, school children and veterans units will be the backbone of the annual Memorial Day Parade to take place next Wednesday afternoon. As part of the Memorial Day program speakers have been arranged for the schools by the Harry R. Bartlett Post 89 and AMVETS Post No. 14 at East Haven High School today. Two assemblies are to be held at which Lieut. (jr) George Heigleman (ret) will be the main speaker. These assemblies will include the middle and upper classes of the three center schools, Mottuin, Highland and Foxon schools as well as the high school students. William Maher, Service Officer of Post 89, will speak at South School Friday.

Sunday in acceptance, to an invitation by Rev. James Waery, members of the Harry R. Bartlett Post will attend in a body the annual memorial service at 11 A. M. in the Old Stone Church. On May 30 the Memorial Day parade is scheduled for 2:30 P. M. All units other than the Bartlett Post and AMVETS will assemble at West End Field promptly at 2 P. M. The legionnaires and AMVETS will line up at the legion rooms and proceed to the assembly point.

The Rev. Virgil L. Wolfenbarger of Foxon will be the main speaker at the Green.

For the first time in the town's history, the newly organized high school band under the direction of Mrs. Wilhelmina Strandberg, of the high school faculty, will make an appearance. Others who will participate are the Bradford Manor Drum Corps, the Y. D. and the Legion Post 89 Bands.

Two hundred and forty graves will be decorated under the supervision of Graves Registration Chairman Thomas McMahon. School children are asked to procure seasonal flowers and members of the East Haven Garden Club will assist in the project. Flowers may be left at the Legion rooms in Thompson Avenue from 7 until 9 P. M. on May 29th and from 9 until 11 A. M. on May 30th. Auxiliaries of AMVETS Post 14 and Legion Post 89 have volunteered to make bouquets from the floral contributions.

AMVET Post 14 is assisting in formulating plans for Memorial Day. Mr. Francis T. Flood, AMVET Commander, will serve as Assistant Chief of Staff. Joseph Rodenak and Charles Boyer, both of Post 14, will serve as Marshal and Chief of Staff. In addition Rodenak is acting as chairman of the parade.

New Fire Alarm Code To Be Instituted Next Sunday Morning

8 A.M. Changeover Time Set By Hayes

A new fire alarm code will be instituted in East Haven starting Sunday morning, May 27th, at 8 A. M. It was announced today by Fire Chief Thomas J. Hayes.

Several new innovations will be including a more complete coverage of the town through signals. Henceforth the center alarm will be sounded for all fires in order that the volunteers from other areas may know if their district is affected.

Thirty-two blasts repeated twice will be the air raid alarm for the center only and in all other districts a continuous sounding of the siren or horn for three minutes will notify townspeople of forthcoming air raids.

The all clear signal for the center will consist of 25 blasts at two minute intervals three times. Other areas will be notified of the all clear by the sounding of a siren or horn for one minute, three times, at two minute intervals.

Chief Hayes said that the box number will be operated three times for fire.

Many additional box numbers and some changes are evident in the new fire calls and all volunteers are urged to equipping themselves with the new system far more detailed than the code the use formerly.

Chief Hayes concluded.

Memorial Poppy Sale Starts In East Haven

The annual sale of Memorial Poppies in East Haven will get underway this week. The event is sponsored by the American Legion and its auxiliary here.

Heading the sale are Mrs. Frank S. Clancy for the Auxiliary and Dominic Ferrara for the Harry Bartlett Post. The street sale will conclude on Memorial Day. Townspeople are asked to cooperate.

The artificial poppy flower is a replica of real poppies which bloom on faraway battlefields and memorializes the actions of American soldiers who have died on foreign fields. They are made by veterans within Connecticut Veteran Hospitals who are paid for their services. Material for their manufacture is furnished free by the Connecticut Department of the Legion Auxiliary.

Thirty years have elapsed since the poppies were adopted by the Auxiliary as its memorial flower. The profits are pledged one hundred percent to welfare relief for services men and women and their families.

Building Department Okays Construction Of 45 Structures Here

Approval for the erection of 45 structures in East Haven was approved by Building Inspector Arthur R. Riccio during the month of April.

Estimated cost of the completed buildings was figured to be about \$205,950. None of the structures are a part of any of the town's many development construction projects.

During April five plumbing permits were granted and six electrical licenses. Fifteen were given licenses to install oil burners and two firms were granted licenses to sell fuel oil via trucks. One gasoline station was allowed a retail license to sell kerosene and three were given permits to store the same fluid.

Eight excavation permits were granted and thirty five were given electrical permits. Nine oil burner permits were allowed and one oil tank permit allowed its installation. Twenty three plumbing permits of all types were granted and thirty five were given the right to install septic tanks. Eighteen power pump permits (clean-outs) were granted and six extra electrical inspections were deemed necessary, three because of violations and a like number for the installation of temporary meters.



TODD MEMORIAL CARILLONS DEDICATED AT NORTH BRANFORD



With special services on Sunday morning, May 2, at the North Branford Congregational Church, carillon bells were dedicated to the praise of Almighty God. They were made possible by a gift of one thousand dollars left to the Church by the late Mr. Charles Todd. This gift was left with no provisions regarding how it should be spent. After careful consideration it was decided that it should be used to provide a permanent memorial to Mr. Todd. It is altogether fitting and proper that this Carillon with deep resonant tones carry the old hymns across the town, forever projecting the Church which Mr. Todd loved so well, into the hearts and minds of all the people.

The word Carillon comes from the Latin word "quadriglio" meaning a simple dance measure on four notes for four persons. Mr. Todd would have liked this.

Since the twelfth century people have been called to worship by carillon bells. The first carillons consisted of a row of small bells which were struck by hand with a hammer. Mechanism made possible more and larger bells until the Carillons in Riverside Drive Church, New York, contain 72 bells of which one bell, the deepest tone, weighs eighteen and one quarter tons.

Until recently the cost and size of Carillon bells made them impossible for small churches. By the use of electronic amplification tiny bells can now be used successfully. This makes carillons possible for small churches. So now vibrachimes join the bell in the steeple of the North Branford Congregational Church upon which this verse is cast.

On holy days From this steeple I call the people To pray and praise.

Mr. Todd lived for many years in North Branford, where he soon became a prominent citizen. He served his town as representative to the State Legislature, was chaplain of Totoket Grange for many years, active member of the North Branford Civic Association and other local groups. He was a well known figure at old fashioned dances in many nearby communities.
